JERSATILITY KEYNOTED the "Music With the Girls" revue which an invited audience of about 2,200 person attended Thursday night at the Capitol theater. The 80 girls in the company rotated their entertaining chores so well that the show included a 22-piece dance band, a Dixieland unit, a singing chorus, a 65-piece brass band, dancing choruses, comediennes, voca soloists, and vocal tries and quartets.

Recording of a broadcast to be heard Saturday on CBS-WKOW preceded the regular show, and for many of the spectators this was novelty in itself. It included samples of chorus, orchestra, and solo work, with Dolores Splizer, a clover marimbaphonist, and Fredn Parker and other singers spotlighted.

Beautifully costumed and efficiently staged, the revue could compete in talent and production with anything of its kind on the road, despite the fact that few of the girls were professionals before joining the troupe. The capable orchestra, directed by Ernest A Villas, backed the acts and production numbers almost perfectly.

Villas and an unnamed property man were the only males of the stage, and the latter furnished some of the best laughs, without

saying a word. A memory sequence topped the big numbers, with cancan girls Police Gazette cover queens, and "Merry Widow" waltzers lavishly costumed. But the audience's favorite was a "Dance That Is Proper number, in which nine girls switched from minust to modern tapping and back again, including a tricky costume change on-stage.
