Midwest Gets Break as East, South Swelter

CHICAGO — (UP) — The Best and South sweltered in 100-degree weather Thursday.

The mercury shot to a recordbreaking 101 at Washington, D. C.
and climbed over 100 in parts of
New York City.

President Truman called off his
press conference and at New
York's City Hall park the pigeons
fought each other to get at the
bird bath.

bird bath. Cleveland had a record-breaking high of 99, but in the South it was

even hotter.

Morehead City, N. C., recorded, 107 degrees compared with a previous all-time high for that coastal city of only 94. Raleigh, N. C., had 104. equalling the all-time record, and Smithfield, N. C., broke its all-time record with 105. even hotter. At least 12 persons had died from the heat and nine drowned

from the heat and nine drowned trying to get relief in the water. The heat wave had swept into the East from the scorched Midwestern plains, where a cooling breeze from the North sent the mercury skidding to delightful readings in the 70's.


At Detroit a buge thermometer in Cadillac Square went crasy with

in Cadillac Square went crary with the heat. When the temperature hit 97 the indicator gyrated wildly and ended up at five below zero.

It was 100 degrees at Hell, Mich.,
but 30 degrees cooler at Paradise,

Temperatures soared into the high 90s throughout much of the castern two-thirds of the nation.
Forecasters said temporary relief was on the way in the form of a cool air mass from the Northern Plains moving slowly toward the

East,
Jt hit Chicago at midday and dropped the temperature from 91 to 74 degrees in 90 minutes.
The cool air may reach New York state by today, but forecasters warned that oven-hot air hanging over the South will move north by Saturday to send the mercury soaring again.
