Republican Convention

TIP OF THE MORNING: First "Day at the Zoo" program (WIBA Sunday) will be about monkeys.

RADIO is going all out to cover the Republican national convention in Chicago next week. All the networks are sending their top reporters to the scene; the National Broadcasting Co. alone will have a crew of 300 on hand. All of Madison's network stations—WIBA (NBC), WKOW (CBS), and WISC (ABC and MBS)—are planning extensive coverage.

Ralph O'Connor, manager of WISC, will broadcast from Chicago Sunday night and each night of convention beginning Tuesday.

He will cover the Wisconsin delegation and its activities. Programs will be at 8:15 p. m. Sunday; 7 p. m. Tuesday, and 7:15 p. m. beginning Wednesday. They will include interviews with delegates.

O'Connor also will be liaison man between the Badgers and ABC radio and television networks throughout the convention, and will return to Chicago to perform the same duties at the Democratic convention.

DISC OF THE DAY: Arthur Godfrey has come up with another pairing that looks like a winner, both for sales and on the juke boxes. The first tune is "Can You Whistle, Johanna?" a happy ditty with plenty of whistling; the second is "Busybody," a reversal of "Slow Poke." Archie Bleyer's orchestra does a quiet but effective backing. (Columbia.)

NAMES IN THE NEWS: New voices at WFOV are those of Ray Lenahan, Madison, and Joe Benton and Don Bennett, Appleton, who replace Glenn Price and Sigrid Lee.

Roy V. Bogas, 18-year-old San Francisco pianist, has won a \$2,000 prize from the San Francisco Foundation. Four years ago he won the Stillman Kelley junior scholarship given by the National Federation of Music Clubs.

THE WARING IDEA: "A singing America is a happy America. Singing makes you feel good inside, and is perhaps one of the greatest expressions of democracy we enjoy."

That's the musical theory of Fred Waring. That's the reason why this summer Fred and his staff of eight music educators will travel 7,500 miles to share the Waring choral technique with other music educators and choral directors.

when they attend summer sessions at the University of Wisconsin July 14-18, and at five other leading colleges and institutions across the nation, from New Hampshire to California.

A busy work schedule, from 9 a. m. until noon, from 2 until 5, and from 7 until 9, will be the order of the day for Workshops. Already music educators from every state in the union, Canada, and South America have registered for sessions at the various schools.

Attending the Workshops will be some 1,200 choral directors, college and high school music teachers, church musicians, state music supervisors, and others active in choral music.

Supervised by Waring and conducted by Dr. Lara Hoggard, these sleepers-rolled-up meetings will include sessions in choral interpretation, microphone and broadcasting techniques, program planning, choral blending, and music reading. It is, in fact, an intensified, practical session during which hundreds of people interested in the same thing will live, eat, and sleep, in a musical atmosphere.
