**WEATHER:** No matter what the weatherman says, Wisconsin Players want me to tell you that there'll be "Rain" at the Wisconsin Union theater at 8 tonight and at 8 p. m. Friday and Saturday.

**TICKETS:** Because of the Republican national convention, the Wisconsin Union theater almost missed having tickets for "Rain."

Only a few companies in the whole country print the kind used here, and the one whose bid was accepted got itself involved with issuing the GOP tickets.

Exchange of coupons for tickets was supposed to start July 7, by July 1 the shipment hadn't arrived. The boxoffice called the printers in New York. The tickets came by air express the next day—in plenty of time to put them in the racks by exchange date.

**THE 1952 state drama contest** sponsored by Wisconsin High School Dramatic Assn. will be held Dec. 13 in Eau Claire State college's new theater.

The state competition will be preceded by league contests Nov. 15, district competitions Nov. 22, and sectional contests Dec. 6.

A school may enter by sending the name of its play to Prof. Robert H. Schacht, secretary-treasurer of the association, at 1327 University ave. One-act plays written by pupils or teachers may be used, Schacht said, if they are approved by Prof. Robert E. Gard. They must be sent to Gard by Oct. 1.

**ELSA LANCHESTER:** If Paul Gregory, producer of "Don Juan in Hell," follows through with his plan for Elsa Lanchester's tour, her "Private Music Hall" will play Madison next fall.

Gregory said that he will sponsor the variety show in "the same 55 cities" visited by "Don Juan"—and that list included Madison.

Miss Lanchester's tour will result from a chapter in her book, "Charles Laughton and I," which told of her vaudeville career in Britain.

**ART:** Ruth Abbott, associate professor of art education at the University of Wisconsin and teacher of art at Wisconsin high school, is one of eight new consultants added to the "Let's Draw" advisory committee.

Others are from Oshkosh, Milwaukee, Eau Claire, Barron, and Sheboygan.

They will help set up the course of study for the radio classes conducted by James A. Schwalbach as a part of the Wisconsin School of the Air on WHA and the state network.

About 90,000 boys and girls were enrolled last year.

**Frank Allis School District Meeting Set**  
Joint School District No. 10 of the town of Blooming Grove and the village of Monona will hold its annual district meeting Monday at the Frank Allis school at 8 p. m. The meeting will be asked to approve a budget for the coming year and to elect school board officers.

The school will be open at 7 p. m. for the public to inspect the budget, officials said.

Four new polio cases were reported by the City Health Department Wednesday, bringing Madison's 1952 total to 13.

All the patients are East side residents, including one boy with some evidence of weakness; a 3-year-old girl and a 15-month-old boy, neither of whom has shown signs of paralysis; and a 42-year-old woman, who is confined at her home with no paralysis.

The total of 13 cases does not approach epidemic proportions in a city of Madison's size, said Dr. C. K. Kincaid, health commissioner, but it is evident that the city will have a larger number of cases this year than in 1951, when the season total was only 20.

Eight of the cases to date have involved no paralysis and there is little evidence to warrant fears of danger at the swimming beaches, Dr. Kincaid said.

A check by the Health Department showed that at least six of the 11 patients stricken in June and July had done no swimming, and data was incomplete on the other five.

The first two cases were reported during the winter.
