British Adventurers Feared Drowned in Atlantic Ocean

DOUARDNEZ, France—(UP)—Mating quarters feared Sunday that Ann Davidson, 38, British adventurer who set out from here June 10 in an attempt to become the first woman to sail the Atlantic alone, might have perished in stormy waters of Gasconne bay.
No word had come from the blue-eyed skipper since she put her 23-foot sloop Felicity Ann out of the tiny Douardnez harbor. She was bound first for Cape Finisterre, Spain's most westward point.
The Felicity Ann, which carried no radio, was towed into port here when she developed engine trouble off the French coast May 24. While workmen repaired the trouble, Mrs. Davidson told newsmen she would make for Finisterre, the Azores, and then "some point along the Florida coast."

U.W. Art Exhibit to Open Today

An exhibit of oils, water colors, ceramics, and metal craft will open today in the gallery of the Art Education building at the University of Wisconsin.
The work of three graduate art students, the show is presented in lieu of Master of Science theses.
"William" Davis, Milwaukee, who received his B. A. degree in biology and now specialized in science illustration, will show a number of small scale, meticulous paintings and drawings." Prof. Frederick N. Logan, chairman of the department graduate committee, said.
Shirley Marvin, Ames, Ia., will show metal craft, ceramics, and water colors. Daughter of a college professor, she did her undergraduate work at Iowa State college and minored in dramatics.
Marion Everson, Madison, teacher in the public schools, who obtained her B. S. degree at the University of Wisconsin in 1945, will exhibit almost entirely in metal craft.
"These three students have all been in residence prior to this summer," Prof. Logan explained. "Later on we will have nine more graduate exhibits, the most we have ever had in a summer session. Although primarily for members of the art education staff to judge, the public is welcome to attend all such exhibitions," he said.

2 Youths Wounded as Wedding Party Ends with Brawl

CHICAGO—(AP)—The bride and groom, police said, left just in time—20 minutes before two celebrants were shot early Sunday when the wedding party ended in a brawl.
Neither of the victims was wounded seriously. But police reported their assailant and two companions were badly bruised after being seized and beaten by most of the 100 guests attending the fête.
The party was held in a rented hall on Chicago's south side.
The victims, Robert Ferguson, 23, and Edward J. Connor, also 23, were released after emergency treatment at Englewood hospital.
Police said they were shot by William Rubio, 20, a stockyard laborer. Rubio and two companions—Tony Segert, 19, and Felix Sakowski, also 19—were held without charge for questioning, police said.
The trouble began, police reported, when Rubio and his companions appeared without invitation at the wedding party of Paul O. Atkins, 19, a stockyard beef handler, and Darlene Becker, 18.
Police said the uninvited guests asked three girls to drink with them and a fight ensued, during which Rubio fired four shots from a .32 caliber revolver.

82nd Congress 'Utter Flop,' Douglas Says

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Sen. Paul Douglas (D-Ill.) said Sunday the 82nd Congress, which adjourned last week, was "an utter flop" as far as domestic legislation was concerned.
He said it had "a pretty good record on foreign affairs and defense preparedness, but on domestic legislation it was hurried in a driving snow storm of special interests."
In an interview over Illinois radio stations, Douglas said of Congress:
"It failed to bring Alaska and Hawaii into the union as states; it passed a discriminatory and inadequate immigration bill; it failed to plug tax loopholes; it continued unnecessary subsidies and pork-barrel projects; it failed to strengthen the Robinson-Patman act."
(The Robinson-Patman act is intended to prevent discriminatory pricing aimed at eliminating competition.)

200,000 Watch Huge Air Show in Europe

BRUSSELS, Belgium—(UP)—More than 200,000 spectators Sunday watched one of the biggest military air shows ever to put on in Europe.
Airmen from 11 Atlantic Pact nations and more than 400 planes put on a three-hour performance of acrobatics, solo, and formation flying. The climax was a mass jump over Brussels airport by a battalion of Belgian paratroopers.
Among the crowd were top Atlantic treaty officers and King Baudouin of Belgium.

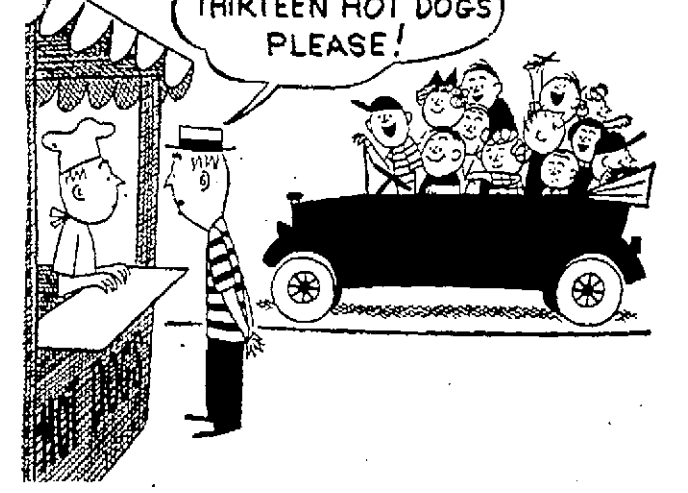

Nixon Experts Added Responsibility as Veep

WASHINGTON—(UP)—Sen. Richard M. Nixon, the young Republican vice-presidential nominee, said Sunday he will make the vice-presidency a "real working position" if the GOP ticket is elected in November.
The 39-year-old Californian flew here Sunday to clean up work in his Senate office. He told reporters he plans a short vacation with his wife and two daughters before assuming the rigors of the presidential campaign.
Nixon said Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower has not told him specifically what additional duties he expects the vice-president to assume. But he said Eisenhower told him that during the general's military career he always liked to give his subordinates as much responsibility as possible.

Iowa's Highlanders Leave for Europe

IOWA CITY, Ia.—(UP)—Iowa's famous Scottish Highlanders, the University of Iowa all-girl haxpaine band, left Sunday for a month-long tour of Europe.
The 60-piece band boarded a train en route to Montreal, Quebec, their port of embarkation for an 11-day voyage to France. They will sail Tuesday.
Remaining in Europe until Aug. 26, the girls will visit France, England, Scotland, Holland, and Switzerland. The band will perform at most of its stops.
