**TIP O' THE MORNING:** Taking advantage of Mickey Spillane's recent magazine publicity, NBC has acquired radio rights to his Mike Hammer stories. Spillane may be narrator.

**DESPITE AN AUTO** accident in which their leading man and pianist were injured, the Roberson-Brooks Players didn't miss a performance.

Wendell Poe, 24-year-old leading man with repertoire company, and Orval Johnson, pianist, were hurt early Tuesday when Poe lost control of the car he was driving. Eric Funnheim, Mt. Horeb, was killed and Mrs. Johnson was injured. The company had played at Mt. Horeb Tuesday night, and was scheduled to open in Beaver Dam Wednesday night. Manager George Roberson called Chicago and found a leading man who knew the opening bill, "Dallas Daisy," and got in touch with Fredrick A. Buerki at the Wisconsin Union theater. Buerki referred him to Marshall Scott, Milwaukee television actor who played the missionary in "Rain" here last week. Scott is an experience stock and repertoire actor, and Roberson got him to take over some of the roles.

The show is a merger of the George Roberson and Jack Brooks tent theaters, both of which have played Wisconsin for many years. Roberson and his wife, Phoebe Fulton, also appeared with the Al Jackson Players at the Garrick (now the Madison) theater.

**NEW EXHIBITS:** Two traveling exhibitions are new this week at the State Historical museum and the Wisconsin Union theater gallery.

"Emerson's New England," a photographic display prepared by Life magazine, opened Wednesday in the first-floor galleries of the museum. It will be up through Aug. 15.

Based on the photographic essay "New England Indian Summer," the collection deals with places and place-names especially associated with Emerson, Thoreau, Hawthorne, Alcott, and Longfellow," the announcement says. "The text... is almost entirely composed of excerpts taken from the 19th century New England writers themselves."

A 62-piece show from the Wisconsin Designer-Craftsmen exhibit of the Milwaukee Art institute will open today in the theater gallery. The Union says:

"The show contains all types of craft articles—textiles, woven materials, silver work, enameled copper jewelry, and ceramics. The exhibitors are teachers of crafts throughout the state, and Wisconsin craftsmen who have exhibited both statewide and nationally."

"The Madison showing is co-sponsored by the university art education department and the Union gallery committee. Arthur A. Vierter, Waunakee, assistant professor of art education, and Gwyn Ricketts, 118 Cambridge rd., gallery committee chairman, are in charge of arrangements."

The show will hang in the theater gallery of the Union through Aug. 18.

**JAZZ:** "Dixie Bash" returned to its home base, Club Hollywood, last weekend after an absence of several months. It had been playing inside the city during the winter and spring.

"Dixie Bash" has been a Madison institution for about two years, and is considered the most successful attraction of its kind ever organized here.

Dick Ruedebusch's combination will headline the "Bash" at 8 p. m. each Sunday, with Rod MacDonald as master of ceremonies. Last week, MacDonald added a "sitting-in" feature, inviting Frank Tilt, trombonist, and Eddie Anderson, trombonist, to join the band for a while.

The Scottish people have taken the bagpipe as their own. It is a land or Lowland festival or party is complete without pipe music, and Scottish military bagpipers are as famous as the noted regiments to which they belong.

There are about 300 laments, battle hymns, and salutes that can be classified as Big Music. They are not for the amateur performer or listener. The Big Music is considered by experts to be truly great national music. It consists of certain melodic lines repeated and varied, with changing groupings of rhythm.

The most famous of all Highland musicians, the MacCrimmons, hereditary pipers to the MacLeods of Dunvegan on the Isle of Skye, wrote, taught, and played the Ceol Beag, scoring the simpler forms of composition.

Donald Ban MacCrimmon, one of the last and greatest of his line, composed the prophetic lament "MacCrimmon Never Will Return" before he followed Bonnie Prince Charlie in the tragic cam-
