When the national tournament begins in Cincinnati a week from today, Peter Levontitt and Dick Kahn will try to repeat their triumph of last year.

They entered the final session of the Master's Club in about 30th place, and came in with a 70 per cent game to win the championship.

No championship can ever be won without first class defensive play, and this was no exception to the rule, as may be seen in the hand shown today.

Kahn opened the top of clubs from the West hand, dummy, played the jack, and declarer overtook with the king. Declarer won with the ace of clubs and entered dummy with the jack of spades in order to return a heart.

Levontitt played his low heart, hoping that South would misguess a possible finesse. As it happened, however, declarer had no finesse and won the trick with the queen of hearts.

He continued hearts, and East won with the king. East's club return was taken by the queen and another heart knocked out East's ace.

At this point Peter Levontitt had to make a key decision. If he fanned, he returned another club, the declarer would take two clubs, two hearts, and two spades. Declarer would then have to lose four diamond tricks in addition to two clubs and two hearts. The two-trick set gave Levontitt a very fine score.

Court Trial Aims to Break Back of Klan Power

ATLANTA - (UPI) - A court trial to "break the back" of the Ku Klux Klan opens in North Carolina today, while officials in Florida investigate a reported attempt to organize the Night Riders into an armed "confederate army" to uphold race segregation.

Superior Court Judge Clawson L. Williams will begin a special court session at Whiteville, N.C., to try Imperial Klansman Thomas L. Hamilton and 65 other Klansmen for a dozen slayings.

The pudgy, bespectacled Hamilton, who directs Klan activities for the Carolinas from his Leesville, S.C., home, was arrested last May, and since then has been speaking at Klan rallies while free on bond.

Florida Klan Chief Earl H. Hendrix of Tallahassee, who is under a two-year probation for publishing defamatory postcards during his recent unsuccessful try for the governorship, announced at Orlando last week he is organizing the Klan into a nationwide "army" to bear arms to uphold segregation.

Federal officers began an immediate investigation to determine if Hendrix's plans could mean a revocation of his parole.
