

Big German Aircraft Plant Opens Again
KASSEL, Germany. — (AP) — The famous German aircraft manufacturer, Junker's, opened for business again Wednesday after a seven-year post-war shutdown.

Although the Allied occupying powers still forbid Germans to build warplanes, the plant will turn out machine tools needed to make the craft until that law is repealed. Germans hope the ban on building civilian planes will be lifted some time this year.

Yvonne Furneaux, 22-year-old native of France, will be the "other woman" in "The Master of Ballantrae," starring Errol Flynn. A British actress, Beatrice Campbell, will play opposite Flynn.

Phyllis Kirk has been added to the cast of "Stop, You're Killing Me," starring Broderick Crawford and Claire Trevor.

Maurice Evans is planning a Broadway production of "Dial 'M' for Murder," a London hit.

Arthur Treacher has signed to star in "See How They Run" on Broadway.

Bill Stern is off the air temporarily because of illness.

H. R. Baukhage threw his "Five Men Report" associates into a ditch with a side remark they never anticipated. The program panel—Cecil Brown, Frank Singiser, Holland Engle, Bank, and Francis Coughlin—had run through the regular introduction. Then Baukhage remarked:

"Baukhage talking—but about what I haven't the faintest idea at this time."
"Family Theater" director Jo Mansfield feels the Democratic National Convention at Chicago is doing him a good turn. Since his program's time has been preempted by the convention, he'll be able to visit his mother in Fall River, Mass., for the first time in four years.

AT THE WARNER LOT: Despite recent fires, production at the Warner Brothers studios is going ahead on schedule, says word from Hollywood.

Work began Monday on "Back to Broadway," with Virginia Mayo, Gene Nelson, Steve Cochran, and Patrice Wymore. Production will start today on "Come On, Texas," starring Randolph Scott. Also in production is "Stop, You're Killing Me."

Next will come "The Jazz Singer," with Danny Thomas and Peggy Lee. Doris Day and Gordon MacRae will start "By the Light of the Silvery Moon" on Aug. 4.

Away from the studio, the Warner company is filming "His Majesty O'Keefe" (Burt Lancaster) in the Fiji Islands and "The Master of Ballantrae" (Errol Flynn) in England. Alfred Hitchcock will start shooting "I Confess" in Quebec on Aug. 14.

Completed on schedule in the last few days in spite of the fire were "Springfield Rifle," starring Gary Cooper, and "The Desert Song," starring Kathryn Grayson, MacRae, Cochran, with Raymond Massey, Ailyn McLeer, and Dick Wesson.

SCHOLARSHIPS: Pres. William Schumann has announced that a limited number of dance scholarships will be available at Juilliard School of Music beginning this fall.

"These scholarships," Schumann said, "will be awarded on the same basis as music scholarships at Juilliard, namely, on demonstrated ability as revealed in competitive examination before a jury of the faculty. The amount of the scholarships will vary in terms of the winner's financial need."

Entering his second year, the dance department, which is directed by Martha Hill, will continue to have on its faculty dancers and choreographers from the fields of ballet and modern dance, including Margaret Craske, Agnes de Mille, Martha Graham, Louis Horst, Doris Humphrey, Ann Hutchinson, Helen Lanfer, Jose Limon, and Anthony Tudor.

The production plans for 1952-53 include a series of six concerts in December by Limon and his company, with the Juilliard orchestra conducted by Frederick Prausnitz, and an April series in which students of the department will appear in a new work composed by Anthony Tudor and in a revival of Doris Humphrey's "With My Red Ties."

REMINDER: Artists of the nation have until Friday, Aug. 15, to file entry blanks for the national competitive exhibition of water colors, drawings, and prints to open at the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York on Dec. 5, 1952. Offering \$9,000 in prizes, the exhibition is open to all artists who are permanent residents of this country. A prospectus with entry blank was mailed in June to more than 14,000 artists, announcing details of the competition.

To be eligible for the competition, an artist must send his entry blank — postmarked not later than midnight, Friday, Aug. 15 — to Roland McKinney, Department of American Art, the Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York 28, N.Y. Any artist who has not received a competition prospectus and entry blank may obtain them by writing to McKinney.

Having filed an entry blank, the Wisconsin artist's next step is to send his entries prepaid to the regional jury, in care of the Newcomb-Macklin Co., 400-408 N. State St., Chicago, Ill. Deliver entries not earlier than Aug. 25, not later than Sept. 4.

FIFTY BEAUMONT: The Melody Maids of Beaumont, Texas, comprised the biggest group of contestants ever to appear on "Strike It Rich." The group, directed by Eloise Milam, is a self-sustaining non-profit amateur organization of girls who give performances at veterans hospitals, army camps, navy and air force bases. More than 50 of them were on hand for the show in an effort to earn some expense money for a trip to Europe to entertain American forces there. Their concerted effort earned them \$325.
