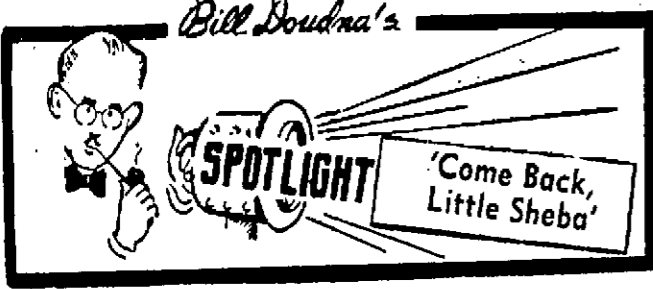

A STRANGE AND MOVING play, neither great nor poor nor mediocre, opened Thursday night at the Wisconsin Union theater, the second offering of Wisconsin Players' summer season.

In spite of such flaws as self-conscious acting and carelessly prepared properties (milk bottles too obviously empty, for example), "Come Back, Little Sheba" held the audience's attention all ways. This was largely the result of its certain tenseness and a constant sense of impending climax.

This was the story of a frustrated man and his thoughtless and utterly commonplace wife, their household tension emphasized and climactically loosened by the freedom and lightness and amorality of youth.

It was the story of "Doc" Delaney, forced out of medical school by his own indiscretion; sent to a sleazy life by alcoholism; loving his wife and showing deep affection for Marie, a co-ed roomer (whether as a daughter or not was never clear), and driven back to drink by the discovery of the girl's deception.

Weldon Sheerer played Doc and Mrs. Margaret Meyer was Lola, his wife. Both built their characters up during the play, but seldom achieved a true feeling of reality.

Sheerer's drunken attack on Lola at the play's peak was, quite appropriately, the most credible scene of the drama—a few minutes of stark tragedy and violent reality.

Vergenne Fosshage was an alternately demure and deceptive Marie, and Donald Hotton sparked some scenes in a minor role as the girl's fiance, John Martinson, as her lover, burlesqued rather than satirized an egotistic athlete.

Best characterization of the cast was that of Gladys Greathouse as neighbor whose opinion of Lola underwent a great change—and how shocked she would have been to know the reason.

Carlos Mittag's setting—a rundown living-room and kitchen—was first-rate.

The play will be repeated at 8 tonight and at 8 p.m. Saturday. Next offering will be "Room Service," July 31 and Aug. 1 and 2.

Miss Holleman will play "Theme and Variations," Schubert, and "Papillons," Schumann.

Mrs. Tibbitts will sing "Allglia," Mozart; "The Lass with the Delicate Air," Arne; "The Riddle," English folk song, and "You Are Love," Kern. Falior's selections will be "Pilgrim's Song," Tschalkovsky; "Dedication," Franz, and "Homage," Del Riego.

They will offer two duets—"Softly as in the Morning Sun," Romberg, and "Sylvia," Spinks.
