Mercy for Murderer

WASHINGTON (UP)—The widow of White House guard Leslie Coffelt seemed pleased Friday that President Truman had shown mercy toward the man convicted in her husband's death.

"There is no malice in my heart toward anyone," Mrs. Coffelt told a reporter. "It is not for me to judge."

Mr. Truman Thursday commuted to life imprisonment the death sentence of Oscar Collazo, one of the Puerto Rican nationalists who had tried to assassinate the president.

Coffelt lost his life defending the president during the attempted storming of Blair House two years ago. Collazo had been sentenced to die Aug. 1 in connection with his death.

News in Brief

TIP OF THE MORNING: Watch for a heavy increase in the number of home, food, and other shows—particularly in smaller cities—next fall and winter.

MELVYN DOUGLAS, Arlene Francis, Martha Scott, and other stars will be featured in a series of dramas to be broadcast by WKOW starting Thursday, July 31, at 9:30 p.m. Called "The Human Heart," it will be presented by the state board of health and the Wisconsin Heart Assn.

Awards in the 1952 Gimbel Art collection, "Wisconsin Artists' View of 1952," will be announced Wednesday, Aug. 13, at a dinner and preview in Milwaukee.

Speakers next week on WIBA's "Your Pastor Speaks" will be the Rev. Arnold Lehman, Monday; the Rev. M. R. Abbey, Tuesday; the Rev. W. A. Schultz, Wednesday; Rabbi Max A. Lipshitz, Thursday; and the Rev. Edward Bier, Friday.

Peggy Taylor, a former teacher from California, has been chosen as permanent vocalist on "Breakfast Club"; she will start her reign at 8 a.m. Monday via ABC-WISC. She was one of eight finalists selected in auditions of 200 singers.

Groucho Marx and Norman Krassa will film their comedy, "Time for Elizabeth," as an independent production. The play broke all records at the LaJolla, Calif., Playhouse with sellout audiences at all performances.

CONVENTION SIDELIGHTS: More than 1,500 miles of magnetic tape were used by Irving Gittlin for "Convention Digest," Columbia's daily summary of the Democrats' doings in Chicago. The complete proceedings of the convention were recorded, as well as caucuses, meetings and interviews. Each day's program represented approximately 150 miles of recordings.

To produce and air the program required a staff of 13 persons. Charles Collingwood did the narration.

Dwight Cooke, covering a caucus at Chicago's Blackstone hotel, used an improvised modern version of the wigwag to transmit a bulletin to the CBS booth at the International Amphitheater 5 miles away.

There were no phones on a caucus floor. He found one in a room on the floor below. He stationed an assistant at the head of the staircase, where he could see him from the caucus room door. The man on the stairs could see the man at the phone. When the flash came, Cooke raised his arms in a pre-arranged code, and the message was flashed from man to man and over the wire to Robert Trout.

Democratic orators were more soft spoken than their Republican counterparts, reports George Mathes, NBC radio engineer who writhed the knobs that controlled the volume of the speeches that went out over the air. However, Democratic applause and cheers were louder than those of the G.O.P. convention, average decibel ratings show. Mathes said the exception to this rule was the reaction to General Douglas MacArthur's keynote address to the Republican convention.

NBC's David Brinkley was interviewing Kentucky delegates on Vice Pres. Alben Barkley's decision to withdraw from the presidential nomination race at 1 a.m. on the Amphitheater floor when he heard a crackling in his communications earphone. "What's?" cried Brinkley. "Take it easy," replied master control, "I'm trying to tell you your view in Washington has just given birth to a son."

Tom Koop, CBS Radio Washington Director of News, is almost a perfect double for Sen. Robert A. Taft. Koop drew a lot of gasps and startled remarks whenever he entered the Amphitheater, particularly during the Democratic sessions.
