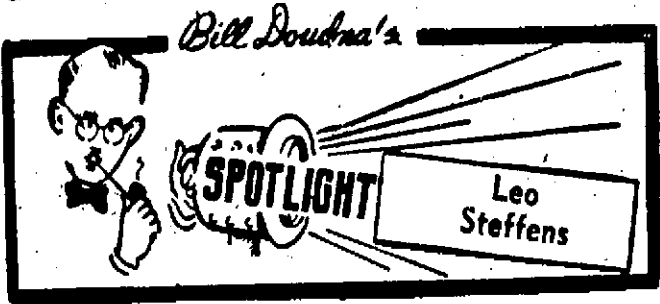

TIP O' THE MORNING: Ann Miller, who turned down the role on Broadway, will play Bianca in the film version of "Kiss Me, Kate."

"SCORN not the short piece," wrote Composer Robert Schumann, for in it, he said, a good composer can tell much.

Leo Steffens headed Schumann in his recital at Music hall Wednesday night, and with his playing added to it the admiration that the pianist should not scorn the short piece, either.

If one counts the eight sections of Schumann's "Fantasie-stücke" individually, Steffens had 17 numbers on his 80-minute program.

Each, at his hands, was a gem—each with a different set of facets, a different color, a different texture from its fellows.

The Schumann work opened the recital with its own contrasts. Some of the parts were quiet and slow, some were powerful and fast; all were dynamic. Some—notably "Grillen"—served to show the warmth of tone which Steffens can give his music.

Then came the intricate "Arabesque No. 1" of Debussy, an early piece which concisely told his intimate knowledge of the instrument, and the same composer's delightful "Polissons d'Or" from his second set of "Images." Faure's almost impassioned, "Impromptu in A-Flat Major" closed first half of the program.

Rachmaninoff and Ravel made up the second portion, emphasizing the latter's mastery of musical understatement in comparison with the full-bodied drama of the Russian.

To the Ravel, Steffens gave all his artistry, all his apparent affection for the composer. The pieces were "Ondine," the brilliant and ingenious water-piece from "Gaspard de la Nuit," and the "Tocatta" from "Le Tombeau de Couperin"—a flashing, fiery, full-cut diamond.

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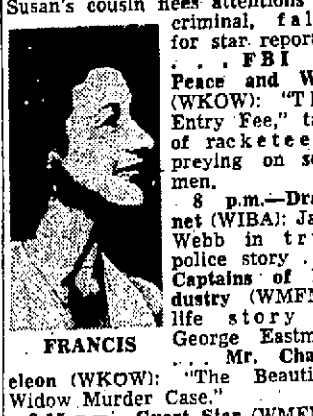
