DISCS OF THE DAY: Recommended records, on the serious side...

"Waltzes," Chopin, recorded by **Linu Lipatti** (Columbia)...

Enchanting music by the young pianist who has become something of a legend since his death in 1950 at the age of 33. A distinguished addition to any library.

"Erwartung," Schoenberg, recorded by **Dorothy Dow** and the New York Philharmonic-Symphony, **Dimitri Mitropoulos** conducting (Columbia)...

This musical monodrama is absorbing for a number of reasons—the fluidity of the music, stemming from Wagner's "endless melody"; the sensitive coloring of the orchestration, kept judiciously behind the singing by the conductor, and Miss Dow's amazing trip through the demanding vocal part. The second side of this LP has Krenek's "Symphonic Elegy" for string orchestra.

"Fourth Piano Concerto," Milhaud, recorded by **Zadel Skolovsky** and the National Orchestra of French Radio, **Milhaud** conducting (Columbia)...

You will find this music bizarre, but underneath the power, the dissonance, and the demands on the pianist's technique lies a sense of happiness. The reverse has the immensely appealing "saudades do Brazil," 12 little dances played by Skolovsky.

"Coriolan" and "Egmont" overtures, recorded by the Philadelphia orchestra, **Eugene Ormandy** conducting (Columbia)...

This is one of the best Beethoven we've heard—especially the Mozart work.

FCC Aide Cancels Western Union's Gambling Order

WASHINGTON — A Federal Communications Commission examiner Thursday ordered cancellation on constitutional grounds of a proposed Western Union regulation aimed at illegal dissemination of racing news.

The order, subject to oral arguments and final decision by the commission, was issued by Examiner **Fanny N. Litvin**. She said the proposed regulation would violate constitutional free speech and free press guarantees.

The order said the regulation would not accomplish its intended purpose. And in discriminating against some customers who might use racing news legally, the examiner said, the regulation "is unjust, unreasonable and discriminatory and bridges the right of free speech and free press."

In effect the proposed regulation, filed last December, would have limited use of Western Union's telegraph wires for dissemination of horse or dog racing news to press associations, radio and television stations, publishers of newspapers with second class mailing privileges.

The telegraph company acted to tighten its regulations after it was criticized by the Senate crime committee for letting professional book makers and organized gamblers use its services.
