Quick Death Told from Few Drops of New 'Nerve Gas'
LONDON—The existence of a new gas that destroys the nervous system, so powerful that in its liquid form a single drop can disable or kill a person within a few minutes, was acknowledged officially Friday.

The chief scientist of the ministry of supply, Sir Harry Gator, authorized the first public disclosure of the "nerve gas." British medical journals printed what they knew about it.

But the account dealt in broad generalities, and the supply minister made it plain that it was produced a mere chink in the curtain of secrecy over the gas.

It was said to be extremely difficult to detect, being almost odorless and invisible.

"The official statement said: 'A drop of the liquid in the eye, or inhalation of the vapor through the skin or mucous membrane, or ingestion, may cause incapacity or death within a few minutes.'

"It prevents the muscles working, and the victim dies from suffocation."

"Liquid on the bare skin penetrates somewhat less rapidly, but two or three drops may kill within half an hour."

"The new gas mask is being produced to give protection against inhalation of the nerve gas."

Retail Food Index Drops, Report Shows
WASHINGTON—(UP)—The government said Friday that average wholesale prices continued to climb last week but that the retail food price index dropped six-tenths of 1 per cent from the record high of mid-July.

Rising for the fourth straight week, average wholesale prices advanced one-tenth of 1 per cent during the week ended last Tuesday, to 111.8 per cent of the 1947-49 average. Increases for cotton goods, burlap, hides, waste paper, and manufactured animal feed combined to push the wholesale index to within 2.8 per cent of the level of January, 1951, when price controls became effective.

The retail food index, based on 36 items, fell 0.5 per cent to 233.7 per cent of the 1935-39 average between July 15 and July 28.
