

TIP O' THE MORNING: Joan Crawford may co-star with Charles Boyer in Norman Krasna's comedy, "Kind Sir," on Broadway this fall.

COMPLETE WITH noble hero, lovely heroine, rascally magician, and fabulous genie, "Aladdin and the Wonderful Lamp" was presented at the Wisconsin Union theater Thursday night by Wisconsin Players.

This, the last show of their summer playbill, will be repeated at 8 tonight and Saturday night, and again Aug. 27 for teachers and directors attending the National Children's Theater conference.

Dr. Dorothy Kester's staging was so good that adults enjoyed the show as much as the children, especially in Ottis Swiger III's dry approach to his role as the pompous Sultan, in the honest boyishness of Leonard Gochman's Aladdin, and in the expert illusions of the magic lamp and the magic ring. True, there were unmagical pauses at times, but practice probably will correct these.

Individual hit of the show was Ottis Swiger III—a slave of the lamp almost as tiny as his name, which was "Piff!"

John Martinson was a super-villainous magician and Dorothy Adelsberg a traditionally beautiful princess, spoiled until found by Aladdin.

Fluid pantomime by the fluorescent-costumed slaves of the ring; Larry Brown's settings, and fantastic costuming added to the interest for all the audience. Above all, there was always plenty of movement.

RETIRING: After 52 years in show business, Hugh Flannery will retire Sept. 2 as manager of the Orpheum theater. Now 68, he entered the theater business when he was 16—as ice-water and opera-glass dispenser at the Grand Opera house in Rockford, Ill.

Much of that 52-year period was spent in Madison. Flannery came here in 1918 to manage the Fuller Opera house (now the Parkway), then in 1920 became manager of the old Orpheum (now the Madison). He left Madison in 1922 to manage the new Palace theater in South Bend, Ind.

From there, Flannery went to the Chicago offices of the Orpheum circuit, where he was supervisor of theaters in 78 Midwestern cities. His work included supervision of the opening of the present Orpheum—to which he returned as manager in 1933. He also became city manager of the Ashley theaters (Parkway, Strand Orpheum, and Madison).

Between his first job and his present one, Flannery was also usher, ticket taker, treasurer, and manager at Rockford; manager at Dixon, Freeport, Oak Park, South Bend and Chicago; ticket seller with Ringling Brothers circus and treasurer of the London Symphony orchestra.

Mr. and Mrs. Flannery plan to leave Madison on Oct. 1 for a long Southern vacation, during which they will seek a suitable place

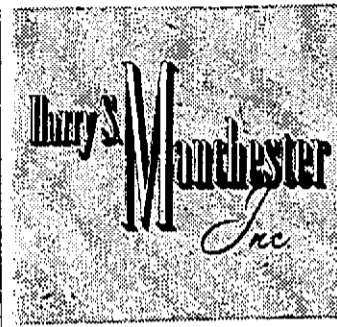

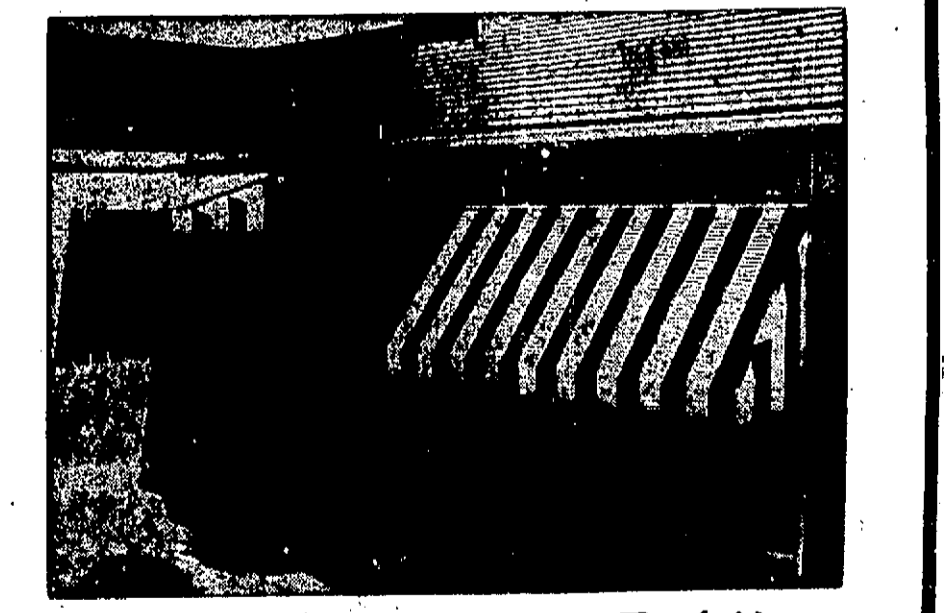

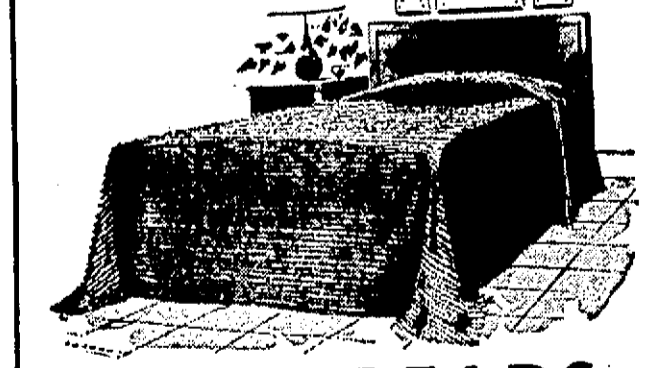
