Just Around the Corner: Fall

Even before the leaves begin to turn (very much, that is), and even before the networks' annual return to standard time, the new radio season is upon us.



Few new programs have been promised so far, but most of the top shows of last season will be back. One reason for the comparatively few changes in schedule which are in prospect is the fact that more than the usual number of programs stayed on the air all summer.

A few summer shows are expected to stay on—notably Spring Byington's "December Bride." About the only new one of any particular interest is "Two for the Money," a quiz program which is supposed to star Fred Allen. But Allen's recent illness may force him to drop it, in which case Herb Shriner probably will on the program.

It looks like "The Big Show" won't be back, a development predicted some weeks ago in "Tip of the Morning." Reasons are (1) that the National Broadcasting Co. hasn't put out a line of publicity; (2) that Musical Director Meredith Willson is being talked about for other programs, and (3) that the show's No. 1 generally credited with being the show's No. 1 man, appears to be working full time on a Community Chest show.

Rob Roy and Robin Hood

During the past few months, millions of persons have watched a motion picture about Robin Hood. This is another example of the hold which Robin has on the public. Books have been written about him, and he was a hero in other motion pictures during past years.
The Robin Hood legends are hard to trace down. We scarcely can be sure that there really was such a man. It is supposed that he lived in England more than 700 years ago. Perhaps there was an outlaw who had that name, but, if so, it is likely that most of the adventures laid to him are the work of fancy.
Closer to our own time is a Scotsman who lived two and a half centuries ago. He was known as Rob Roy, and has been nicknamed "The Scottish Robin Hood."

Rob Roy was a member of the old MacGregor clan. Long before, the MacGregors had fallen into trouble with their neighbors and with the government. Efforts had been made to destroy the clan, and to force the members to give up their family name. Living in the highlands, however, many MacGregors were able to meet in secret and keep their clan together, despite the officers of law.
A band of bold men gathered around Rob Roy. All of them were outlaws, and reports spread about how they had robbed and plundered. As an excuse for their money, some said that they took money from the rich and gave it to the poor, but there is little doubt that most of their stealing was done for selfish purposes.

Various members of the band lost their lives in fights with soldiers or others who were sent against them. Rob Roy was able to keep free of punishment, and died in sleep when he was fairly old. In his later life, he felt sorrow for some of his deeds.
There might have been a hanging of Rob Roy after he was captured one day. He was placed under heavy guard, but used craft to escape. He told his guards that he wanted to send a message to his wife, and was allowed to speak to a servant who was waiting in front of the building. Suddenly, turning away from the servant, he mounted a horse which had been tied nearby, and rode off.
