### Volcano Rises 50 Feet a Month in Philippines

MANILA —(AP)—Didicas volcano, the newest phenomenon of the Pacific, still is building its massive torso at the remarkable rate of 50 feet in height each month.  
Its sulphurous cone, now nearly 900 feet above the waves, wears a two-mile high plume of smoke in the familiar mushroom shape of an atom bomb cloud.  
A Philippines government survey team flew over the volcano off Northern Luzon Island Saturday to check its progress. It had grown 100 feet in two months.  
The mysterious volcano first appeared in 1856 and in four years mounted to 700 feet above sea level. Then the fires subsided and the volcano crumbled beneath the waves, leaving in sight only a scattering of boulders known to seafarers — the Didicas Rocks.  
As mysteriously as it disappeared, it reared to visible life again this year and was discovered

### French Scientist to See if He Can Live Off the Sea

CASABLANCA —(AP)—Dr. Alain Bombard set out to sea his frail raft Sunday, hoping to drift to the Canary Islands.  
The French scientist, seeking to prove that shipwreck victims can live on what they find in the sea, started his journey in a heavy fog and in the face of contrary winds.  
Bombard took along a box of American Army rations intended to nourish a man for 24 days. He explained that he did not expect to have to use this emergency supply of food on the trip to the Canaries, but wanted it for the next leg when there might be danger of being caught in the circular currents of the Middle North Atlantic, where he might not be able to catch any fish.  
He is traveling without radio, and it was only in Casablanca that he bought a treatise on navigation. He hopes to come up on this document while drifting toward the Canaries. As supplementary reading he has some detective stories and scientific books.  
Another acquisition in Casablanca was a filter to trap plankton, a tiny organism in the sea on which the smaller fish live. Bombard hopes to find some nourishment from the plankton in case he can find no fish.  
This is the most dangerous portion of the trip that Bombard has attempted on his little raft, called "The Heretic."

### JACOBY ON BRIDGE

Some bids are too delicate to be used with the average partner. Save them for your expert partner, but make things as easy as possible for the partners you usually get.  
In the hand shown today, South was a very well-known expert, but his partner was an equally well-known palooka.  
South could hardly afford to let the opponents play the hand at three clubs, (which they could have made), but it was foolish of him to experiment with a bid of three diamonds.  
An expert North would have realized that the bid of three diamonds was only a tentative offer and not a firm commitment.  
South had already passed at two hearts, and was therefore sure to have some satisfactory holding in hearts.  
South's only point in bidding the diamonds was to discover whether or not the diamonds were better than the hearts. North was expected to bid three hearts unless he had an excellent fit for diamonds.  
Unfortunately, North knew nothing about such refinements.  
He had already bid his hearts and he didn't see how he could make a second bid on his miserable hand.  
If South's diamonds were so strong, North decided, let him play the hand where he evidently wanted to be.  
The result at three diamonds was very sad indeed. West led the jack of spades, dummy covered with the king, and East won with the ace.  
East switched to clubs, giving his partner two tricks in that suit. East over-ruffed dummy on the third round of clubs, cashed the queen of spades, and led a third spade.

### Air Force to Use Cheaper Trainers

WASHINGTON —(AP)—The Air Force has decided to use smaller, cheaper airplanes for the early training of pilots.  
An Air Force spokesman said plans have been approved for the nine civilian schools holding Air Force flight training contracts to pool their resources and buy the necessary planes.  
The schools have agreed to buy up to 270 airplanes.  
The light planes will cost only about \$3,400 each, a fifth of the cost of the standard trainer, and will be less expensive to operate.

### INDIA PROTEST SET

NEW DELHI, India —(AP)—The Foreign Ministry announced Sunday India will raise the question of the passive resistance movement of non-Whites in South Africa before the next session of the United Nations General Assembly.
