SPOTLIGHT

Miniature 'Shrew'

TIP O' THE MORNING: Herb Shriner definitely will take over "Two for the Money" on NBC, originally set for Fred Allen.

TELESCOPED INTO A LITTLE more than an hour's playing time, "The Taming of the Shrew" was presented arena style Monday night in the dining room of the First Congregational church, with the Orchard Hill Players doing a fast-paced, spirited piece of work.

The lively play, with its many addresses to the audience, fits well into the intimacy of the arena, or "theater in the round" style; at least it did in Sherry Abrams' staging, which used no scenery and few properties.

Abrams' cutting minimized the major difficulty of one-set staging of Shakespeare—the matter of time lapses. His arrangement of the action reduced another—the change of place. In the latter, his clever use of moving voices behind screens at the spectators' backs helped immensely.

The intimate atmosphere culminated in an invitation to the audience to have refreshments on the stage, with the actors serving. Don Soule and Marie Lezzi teamed perfectly as the swaggers, ruddy Petruchio and the shrewish Katherine, respectively. Soule fit the arena style especially well with his healthy voice always easily understood. Both used the arena's space efficiently all the time, often seeming to fill it with their action.

Talle Handler's slapstick playing of Grumio and Charles Mark's facetious handling of Baptista, Kate's wise and resigned father, also scored with the audience. Abrams contributed a nice bit as Vincentio, the old man whom Petruchio uses as one means of subduing his wife.

About the only disconcerting features were the use of a combination of modern and ancient costumes and makeup which approached the grotesque. But the fun and action made one almost forget them.

AT THE CIRCUS: Circus-goers are used to seeing fierce lions, but funny ones are something else. This year's edition of "the greatest show on earth"—the Ringling Brothers and Barnum and Bailey Circus—has lions that are both ferocious and comic.

They are Oscar Konyot's eight Nubians, which appear to take equal delight in milling around the area savagely and letting the trainer flick their noses or put his helmet on their heads.

The act's windup, according to a review of the New York opening in the Billboard, "has the cats leaping nearly midway to the top of the cage and racing almost completely around the walls. Beasts are ferocious at this point, milling in the middle of the arena and fighting to leap over Konyot and on to the walls."

The circus will play at 2:15 and 8:15 p. m. Sunday at Truax Field, with doors open at 1 and 7 p. m. Reserved seat tickets are being sold now at Karstens.

NORSE ART: While Prime Minister Oscar Torp of Norway will include Madison on his tour of Norwegian-American cultural centers next month, the Norwegian Printmakers exhibit has not been scheduled for the city.

The exhibition will take to the road with a showing Sept. 1 to Oct. 1 in San Francisco, then visit Chicago, Baltimore, St. Louis, Washington, and Cincinnati.

Another exhibit, "Norwegian Decorative Art Through 1,000 Years," will open Oct. 10 at the Smithsonian Institution in Washington.

DISC OF THE DAY: Pleasant and familiar airs have been recorded by Zino Francescatti, with Arthur Balsam as accompanist. In an album called "Encores" (Columbia). Neither dismisses the music as too slight for artistry; the result is an engaging and lustrous playing of such things as the "Meditation" from "Thais," "Londonderry Air," Vivaldi's "Chaconne," and Kreisler numbers.

NAMES IN THE NEWS: Two ice shows have been booked into Chicago. Sonja Henie will star in her "1953 Ice Revue" Sept. 11-28 at the International Amphitheater, with performances nightly except Sundays and Mondays and with matinees Saturdays and Sundays. The Shipstads-Johnson "Ice Follies of 1953" will be at the Arena beginning Oct. 9, with shows every night and matinees Saturdays and Sundays.

Dorothy Kilgallen, of "What's My Line," and her husband, Dick Kollmar, will leave New York Sept. 13 on a two-week trip to Europe. The program will move from NBC to CBS Sept. 4.

Zasu Pitts will star in a Broadway revival of "The Bat," mystery drama by Mary Roberts Rinehart and Avery Hopwood which began a run of 867 performances at the Morosco theater in 1920.

All the members of the First Drama Quartet will be heard on CBS "Suspense" during its 10th anniversary season. Agnes Moorehead will revive "Sorry, Wrong Number" on Sept. 15. Charles Laughlin will be in "Jack Ketch" on Sept. 22. Charles Boyer in "Vidocq" on Sept. 29, and Sir Cedric Hardwicke in a still-to-be-chosen vehicle on Oct. 6.
