



**TIP-O' THE MORNING:** The Stand Rock Indian Ceremony at Wisconsin Dells will be given twice daily this Saturday and Sunday—at 8:30 and 9:45 p.m.—because of an expected heavy attendance.

Thomas Gruenewald, Sheboygan, has been named outstanding speech student at the National Music camp, Interlochen, Mich. The 17-year-old son of Dr. and Mrs. Ludwig Gruenewald will receive a full-tuition scholarship for next year's camp. He played the male lead in "Stage Door," designed and constructed the setting for the play, was an outstanding art student, and sang in the high school and festival choirs.

**DISC OF THE DAY:** William Warfield's big, round voice is heard to advantage in "Ancient Music of the Church," recorded by Columbia with Andrew Tietjen, organist, and Otto Herz, pianist, as accompanists. Most of the religious music, as well as ballads which complete the set, is seldom sung, but Warfield's fine phrasing, perfect coloring, and warm voice make one wonder why.

**ART EXHIBITS:** Fifteen exhibits by graduate students in art education set a new record this summer for such shows at the University of Wisconsin, Prof. Frederick M. Logan of the art education department said Tuesday.

Most of the exhibits consisted of the works of art teachers who produced some of the work during their winter teaching jobs, Logan said.

"A good teacher must keep up his own creative work in some art field; otherwise he is apt to become sterile and repetitive," he said. "I don't mean that he must strive to become a professional artist or painter, but that he must do some type of creative work."

"Within the past two years, a group of art teachers in the Fox river valley got together and held their own art exhibit because they wanted to keep their teaching fresh and creative. By working themselves, they meet the same problems their students face. Last summer a group of our graduate students arranged for an exchange of exhibits among their own schools," Logan added.

This was the fourth year in which exhibits have been a regular requirement of the art education department for candidates for a master's degree. The only "visual" masters' theses on campus, they were instituted by the faculty to provide greater impetus to the work of graduate students. All faculty members turn in advisory comments on each show and a committee of three faculty judges gives final approval.

"The job of arranging and hanging a show is good experience in itself," Logan pointed out. "Each has a design of its own. You can tell in a second if one is not well-organized—the show looks like a hodgepodge."

As an orchestra gives a concert so artists hold art shows and both aim for similar results—education of the senses and better public relations, Logan said.

"We place a great deal of stress on the importance of exhibits for students, faculty, and the general public. You see, most people are verbal-minded and we are interested in having them move beyond the verbal stage into one of broader sensory awareness. In addition exhibits are good public relations, like a band at a football game or a concert by the university orchestra."

Getting a master of science degree in art education requires a lot of hard work. In addition to the master's exhibit, students must write a research seminar paper; pass a three-and-a-half hour written examination, that may be philosophical, technical or both; take an oral exam; and maintain a grade average of B or better.

The masters' exhibits are continuous throughout the year, but the majority take place during April or May.
