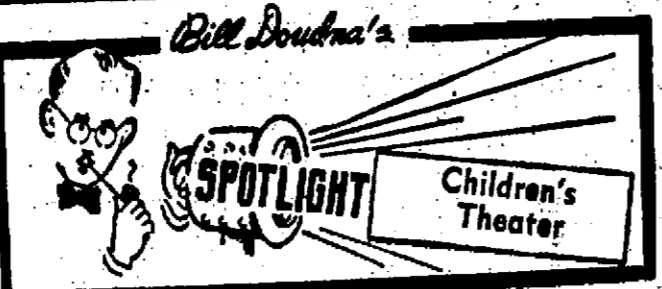

**TIP O' THE MORNING:** Gen Dwight D. Eisenhower's speech in Philadelphia a week from tonight will be carried simultaneously on the NBC radio and television networks.

**THE** first full day of activity at the eighth annual convention of the Children's Theater conference will begin at 10 a. m. today with a general meeting in the Wisconsin Union theater.

Registration started Wednesday and will continue at 8:30 a. m. today, with a total attendance of about 300 expected for the three-day session.

First event of the conference was a special performance by Wisconsin Players of "Aladdin" in the theater Wednesday night. However, many of the convention-goers arrived early to attend a specialized three-day workshop conducted by the University of Wisconsin from Monday through Wednesday, and saw the Orchard Hills production of "The Taming of the Shrew" Monday night.

Kenneth L. Graham of the University of Minnesota, chairman of the conference board, will preside at this morning's general meeting. Speaker will be Dr. E. T. McSwain, dean of the university college, Northwestern university, who will discuss "The Significance of the Art Experience in the Development of a Child's Total Personality."

At a noon luncheon in Great hall of the Memorial Union, Gail Plummer of the University of Utah will speak on "Publicity and Business Management of Children's Theaters."

The convention will move outdoors for its afternoon program—production and analysis of a children's play. The play will be given by the Milwaukee Municipal Drama Workshop on the Memorial Union terrace at 2. Robert Pitman, director, and his staff will analyze the production after the performance.

At 5 p. m., the delegates will be guests of Pres. and Mrs. Edwin B. Fred of the university at a reception at the official residence.

The convention will break up into discussion groups for the first part of the night session, starting at 7:30. Subjects will be "The Children's Theater Curriculum in a College or University," "The High School Actor and the Children's Theater," "The Role of the Private Studio in Community Children's Theater," "The Ways and Means of Presenting Community Programs," and "Children's Theater and the Community."

At 8:15, the Milwaukee Players will present "A Midsummer Night's Dream" in Room 272, Bascom hall.

Milwaukee was the first Badger state city to be saluted on the program, "Way Back Home," which is broadcast to American service men and women in all parts of the world.

Familiar touches of Milwaukee were produced and tape recorded by WJML and were broadcast by 60 overseas stations of the Armed Forces Radio Service (AFRS).

Madison will be honored similarly when a recording made by WJML is broadcast.

BRITT, Iowa, (UP)—"Scoop Shovel Scotty" was elected king of America's hoboes Wednesday as thousands of Iowans crowded this little town to do honor to the nation's burns.  
It was a long-sought victory for "Scoop Shovel," who's been campaigning 18 years for the post, paying 20,000 persons poured into Britt, whose normal population is 3,000, to watch a two-hour parade. Afterwards they were served Muligan stew, the traditional hobo's fare, from huge iron vats.  
"Cannonball" Baker, the deposed hobo king, was not on hand to seek reelection from the tattered "delegates." However, Sylvia Davis, the reigning queen, was reinstated on her throne.

**Farm Leader Urges Withrow's Re-Election**

Pointing to former Congressman Stevenson's bad voting record on legislation of great importance to farmers, Kenneth W.
