

TIP OF THE MORNING: Television's unceasing demand for new films has led one major Hollywood film studio to channel two-thirds of its production staff into work on half-hour video shows.

CHILDREN'S plays are so important themselves in the development of the child's personality that they should stand by themselves; they need not merely supplement or implement units in other school subjects, Dean Eldridge T. McSwain of the school of education of Northwestern university said here Thursday.

This brought hearty applause from his audience at the opening session of the eighth annual Children's Theater-convention in the Wisconsin Union theater.

A children's play, McSwain told the audience, should contribute to the individual's art experience and the teacher or director should put less emphasis on the quality of performance than on what the children are getting out of the production.

"We should prevent children's memorizing other people's creative work," he said, stressing the importance of making the production truly the work of and for the pupil.

"Let them change the script," he advised. "Let them leave out characters, change a minor one into a major one, change the words."

If we want the child to have full value of his art experience, McSwain said, we must let him make his own interpretations and help him to see that art is in himself, not in the process of production.

"If adults listen in, let them be children, too," he said.

Dorothy Schwartz, of Birmingham-Southern college, Birmingham, Ill., presided as program chairman. The delegates were greeted by Prof. Robert Gard, director of the Wisconsin Idea theater; Leroy Luberg, assistant to the president of the University of Wisconsin, and Prof. Kenneth L. Graham of the University of Minnesota, chairman of the Children's Theater Conference board.

TODAY: This morning's convention program will include a panel discussion on "Problems of Trouping" and a business session. At 1 p. m., the Minnesota Young People's University theater will present a dance pantomime, "Ali Baba."

The group will leave at 2 p. m. for Devil's Lake State park and Wisconsin Dells. The trip will include a visit to the Orchard Hill theater for a presentation of "Circus Day" by the Baraboo Theater guild; picnic supper in the park; a boat trip through the dells of the Wisconsin river, and a visit to the Stand Rock Indian ceremonial.

BAND CONCERT: Charles Faulhaber will conduct a concert by the Madison Musicians assn. band at 3 p. m. Sunday in Vilas park. William Druckenmiller, flutist, will be soloist.

Faulhaber moved to Madison from Sheboygan in 1951, becoming president of the Ward-Bradt Music Co. He formerly conducted high school bands at Algoma and Sheboygan and was director of the Wuerli Concert band of Sheboygan, which placed first in the 1950 Cedarburg Festival of Music and the 1951 Wisconsin Spectacle of Music at South Milwaukee.

Druckenmiller recently was heard as soloist with the University of Wisconsin Summer Session chorus.

SUMMER THEATER: The Orchard Hill theater at Devils Lake State park will end its season Sunday night. The current play is "September Tide," by Daphne DuMaurien. Marjorie Schaffer plays the role created by Gertrude Lawrence in London in 1948. Other cast members are Marie Izzi, Don Soule, Don Phelps, Charles Mark, and Tallie Handler.

NAMES IN THE NEWS: A new musical program will reach Madison on Saturday, when Bob Bruzen, pianist and singer, entertains at 8:10 a. m. from the studios of WKOW. Bruzen's program has been heard on WEAU, Eau Claire, and WTCH, Shawano. He recently appeared at the Northern Wisconsin State fair at Chippewa Falls.

Lionel Barrymore will replace James Hilton on the CBS "Playhouse" when it returns to the air. The program will move to Sundays, starting Sept. 7. First production will be "Treasure Island," with Barrymore as Long John Silver.

Nora Kaye will be back on Broadway this fall as principal dancer in "Two's Company," the revue starring Bette Davis.

Van Heflin will make a five-month tour in "The Shrike." This will be his first stage chore since he appeared with Katherine Hepburn in "The Philadelphia Story" in New York and on a tour which included Madison.

Michael Gordon will direct "Maggie," musical version of Barrie's "What Every Woman Knows." Rehearsals are scheduled to start in New York in December. Meanwhile, Gordon will stage "See the Jaguar."

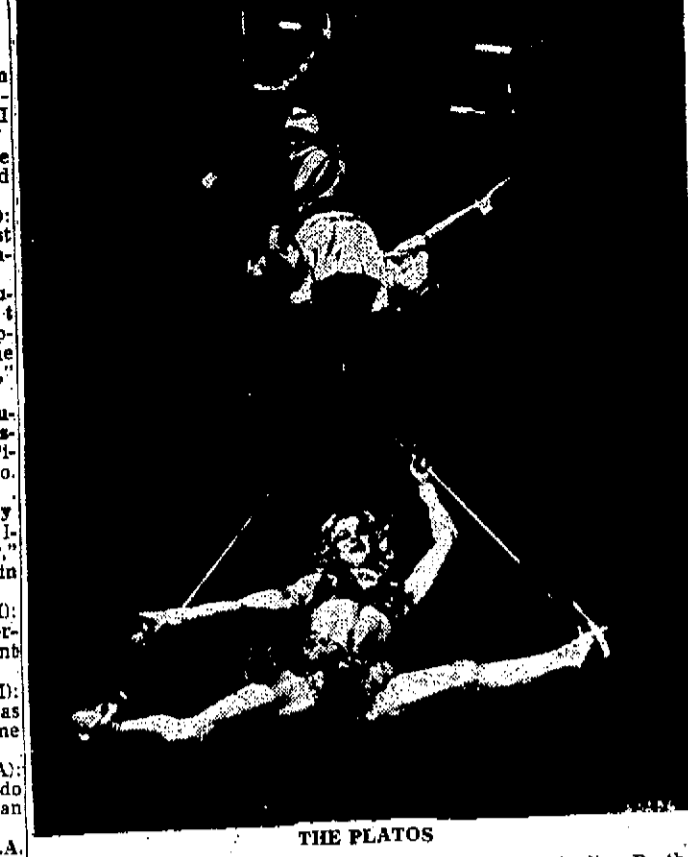
