

REALLY CIRCUSY CIRCUS, with everything but pink lemonade (this year it was orange), the 1952 edition of "The Greatest Show on Earth" gave two performances Sunday under the big top at Truax Field.

This was the 42nd visit of Ringling Brothers' circus - now Ringling Brothers and Barnum and Bailey Combined circussince the Baraboo boys went on the road in: 1884, and only the second, time in all those years that it had shown here on a Sunday.

The show really began at 5:55 a.m. with the arrival of the first section of the 75car train from Fond du Lac. Hundreds of citizens were at the Commercial ave. tracks before that, and the crowd had swollen to a couple of thousand by the time the second section rolled in at 9 and the third shortly thereafter

Other thousands were at Truax Field to greet the first wagons to arrive, to watch the cookhouse go up, and to see the preparations for KAY CLARKE breakinst before the menagerie, sideshow, and big top paraphernalia began reaching the lot.

Everybody agreed, as usual, that a miracle had taken place when, only a little more than eight hours after the first cars arrived, the matines began right on time.

Almost everything was new; in fact, there were fewer holdover acts than at any time in this reviewer's memory.

Among the favorites to return were Emmett Kelly, Otto Griebling, and other famous clowns; the Flying Concellos, with Madison's own Kay Clarke doing an intrepid mid-air exchange of trapezes with another member of the troupe; Justino Loyal, the somersaulting rider, and his company; Miss Mara, trapese artist who did amazing heet and neck swings; Pinito Del Oro, balancing trapeze performer; the Rodry brothers, another aerial thriller, and Robert de Vasconcellos, dressage expert, and Czeslan Mroczkowski's horses, including one which "froze" on its back.

Outstanding new acts included these: .

The Camillo Mayer troupe, high-wire act which closed the pro-

gram: Dieter Tasso, juggler, who while balanced on a slack wire piled eight saucers, and a coffee pot on his head at the same time, tossing in a lump of sugar and a spoon for good measure;

Konyot's llops, a group of eight trained to "speak," fight back, and do some of their tricks without the trainer's using any weapon and finishing their number with leaps across a hurdle, the trainer, and each other;

Hammerschmidt's Wonder Apes, delightfully trained monkeys; Helmuth Gunther, another fine juggler:

The Renals-Ferroni due, a fast-moving act on the "rollo-rollo," involving tricky balancing;

The Gimmas troupe, acrobats.

To burnish the show with glamour, Ringling-Barnum had five 'spectacles," all of them beautifully costumed and well produced. Best of all was the first, "The Good Old Times," with representations of cave men, Helen of Troy, Diogenes, Hannibal on the Alps, Cleopatra, Lady Godiva, and other characters of history and legend, -

The finale, "Gold Dollar Moon,' featured Merel Evans' band/in gorgeous costume, 15 of the show's elephants, and gayly caparisoned $\frac{12}{12}$ performers. Meanwhile, Daredevil Connley balanced in a crescent moon high up under the canvas, but he was almost lost to the color and sound of the spectacular ground show.


