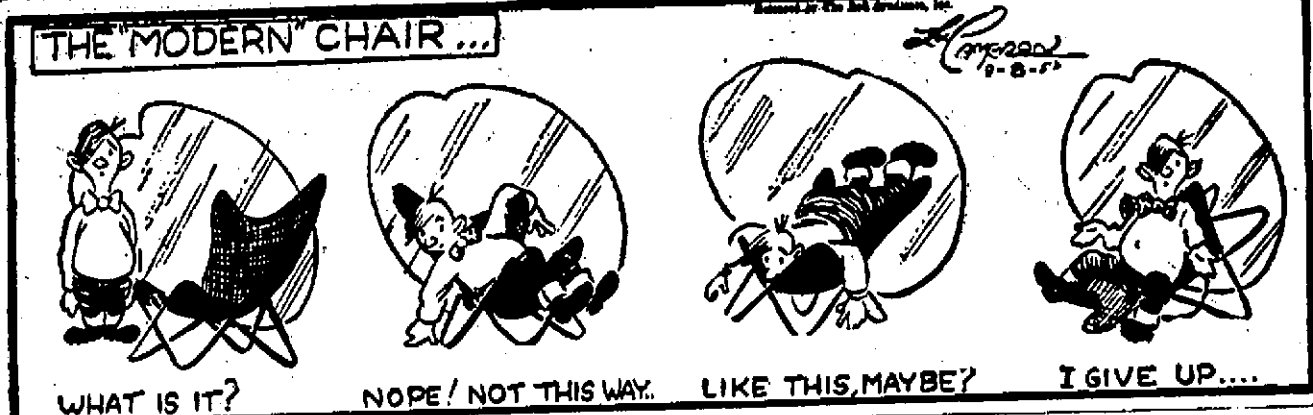

JACOBY ON BRIDGE

By Oswald Jacoby

I have heard people complain about being too rich, but I must admit I have never suffered from this complaint.

I have seen other sufferers, however—that is, at the bridge table. South suffered from this rare complaint in the hand shown today.

West opened the Jack of hearts, East put up the queen, and South won with the ace. South could see lots of pleasant finesses to take in the black suits, so he entered dummy with the king of diamonds to try the spade finesse.

West won with the king of spades and promptly returned a diamond since his partner had dropped the queen of diamonds on dummy's king.

This forced out dummy's ace of diamonds, and left the contract dependent on the club finesse. When this failed the opponents took a trick in each suit, setting the contract.

South's trouble was that he was too rich for his own good. Take the two black aces out of the South hand, and give them to West in exchange for the two black kings.

With this change, South is poorer, but he will never dream of losing his contract.

South's natural play after winning the ace of hearts is to lead a low trump in order to force out West's ace (assuming West has both black aces). West can cash a heart and switch to diamonds, but dummy wins with the king of diamonds, draws trumps, and knocks out the ace of clubs. Dummy's ace of diamonds remains as

an entry which would establish clubs.

A really fine declarer would not be bothered by having aces instead of kings. The correct play in the original hand is to win with the ace of hearts, cash the ace of spades, and then lead a low spade. It is a fatal error to use up a top diamond to try a finesse in either black suit.

Mob Riots, Burns Homes, Newspapers in Bogota

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP)—A mob returning from the funeral of five policemen set fire Saturday to the headquarters of the Liberal (opposition) party, the plants of two of the nation's leading newspapers and homes of two leaders of the opposition party.

Three persons were injured in the incendiary outbreak, and all five buildings were damaged by the flames. The big Liberal morning paper El Tiempo was unable to publish Sunday, and it was unknown whether the liberal afternoon paper El Espectador would be able to appear today.

Scattered shooting was heard during the early moments of the riot, but so far as is known no one was hit. The Conservative (pro-government) newspaper El Siglo said Sunday that the trouble started when "several unknown persons fired on police and people returning from the funeral."

Army troops, tanks and armored cars moved into Bogota Saturday night to prevent a repetition of the explosive riots of April, 1948, but the temper of the rioters cooled quickly and no large-scale street fighting was reported.
