



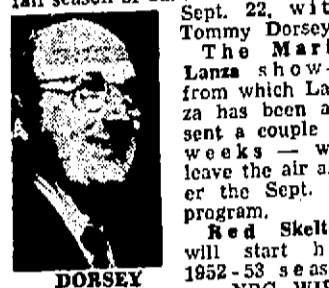
TIP OF THE MORNING: "Your His Parade" will be broadcast by NBC-WIBA from Camp McCoy at 7 p. m. Friday.

## City's Visual Standards for Schools Upheld

Madison parents can be certain that every effort is made in the city's schools to provide classrooms with proper visual conditions, and to discover eyesight defects in pupils, they were told today.

Noting a check list issued by the Wisconsin Optometric Association citing requirements for classrooms with proper visual environment, Supt. of Schools Philip H. Falk pointed out that all new Madison classrooms are built to meet the latest standards and one eye is funded to conform as rapidly as conditions are available.

Average Below Par The visual environment in the average Wisconsin classrooms is below the par the association claimed, noting that visual handicaps are found by surveys to rise steadily from grade to grade.

Major requirements listed by the association include adequate, evenly distributed light, ceilings and walls painted in pastel colors to reflect light, adjustable seats and desk sets to fit the child, and pasted chalk boards in place of the old-fashioned black slate.

All these factors are considered in planning new classrooms or remodeling old ones in Madison schools, Falk pointed out.

An attempt to discover visual handicaps in pupils is made in health examinations required of pupils when they enter the city schools in kindergarten and every three years while they remain in the city system, Falk added.

These physical examinations also seek to reveal other defects, and school officials urge that they be made by private physicians.

Elements Listed Five elements of adequate eyesight listed by the optometric association are near acuity, far acuity, depth perception, adequate field of vision, and binocular coordination.

A child will rarely complain about poor sight, eyes specialists pointed out, because he doesn't know just how well he should see.

LOST—ONE FILM TEST: Gary Cooper has begun a search to locate his first screen test which he paid for himself and which cost \$85.

Cooper isn't the kind of actor who keeps press clippings, programs, or other data concerning his career, but he has developed a strong curiosity to view his initial attempt at emoting.

The star has made dozens of tests since then. Most recently he was photographed in various wardrobes and make-ups before starting work in "Springfield Rife."

These tests and most of his others are readily available for Cooper to see. However, not one is the original for which he had to shell out his first hard-earned money.

In that first test, Cooper used a borrowed horse, and the make-up

man was a friend who applied the grease paint gratis. The scene was filmed in a field, where the Farmers' Market, tourist-famous Los Angeles food center, now stands.

"I ran the gamut of emotions," Cooper said, "to show producers and casting offices what I could do. I did some scenes sitting in the saddle, and others while talking to my horse."

"I didn't waste much footage, and film was too expensive," Cooper has traced the spool of 200 feet of film from the office of his then-agent to a film producer who asked to see it but never received it. There the trail ends. So if anyone in or out of the industry knows where the test can be found, the actor would like to be informed.
