Chicago Symphony Brass Ensemble to Tour State

The Chicago Symphony Brass Ensemble will spend the week of Sept. 22-28 traveling Wisconsin to give music educators and high school students the opportunity to hear them play and lecture.

Sponsored by the Wisconsin School Music Association and the University of Wisconsin Extension division, clinics will be held in the following areas:

Rice Lake, Sept. 22; Wisconsin Rapids, Sept. 23; Richland Center, Sept. 24; Green Bay, Sept. 25, and Whitewater, Sept. 26.

The ensemble includes Frank Crisafulli, trombone; Arnold Jacobs, tuba; Adolph Merse, trumpet; Hugh Cowden, French horn; and Renold Schilke, trumpet.

Each member is a recognized master of his instrument and an authority in the field of brass literature, interpretation, and instruction.

All clinics will follow the same pattern. They will open at 10 a. m. with a concert by the ensemble, followed by clinics for each instrument, with a break for lunch. At 2:30 p. m. a summary concert and clinic is scheduled, to be followed by a directors' roundtable and discussion and the dinner.

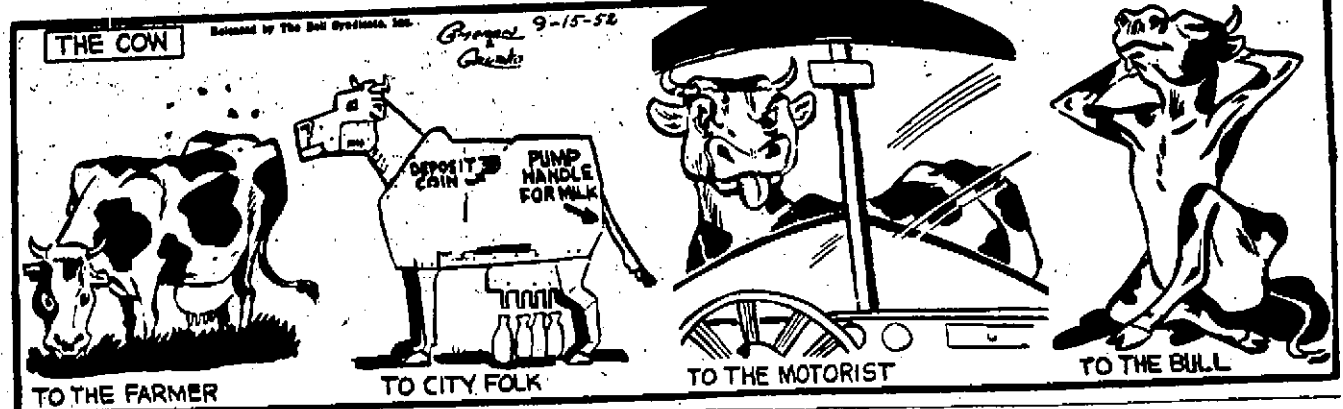

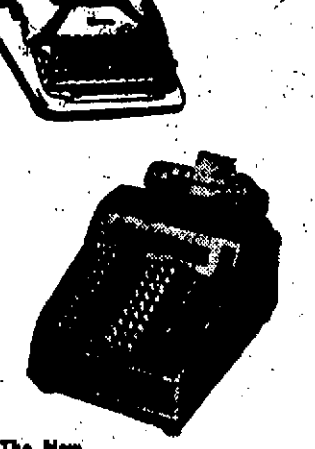
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
