

SPOTLIGHT Closed Circuit

TIP OF THE MORNING: The Northwestern-USC football game Friday, Sept. 26, will broadcast at 9:30 p. m. Madison time by WIND, Chicago (560 kc.)

CLOSED circuit television, widely discussed as an educational tool at the University of Wisconsin, and the use of television cameras are being demonstrated this week at the Parade of Homes.

In closed circuit operation, television pictures travel by cable, rather than through the air, to the receivers. The temporary studio in the show's exhibition tent sends the telecasts to receivers in that tent and in many of the homes on display.

More than \$25,000 worth of electronic equipment was brought to Madison by the television transmitter division of Allen B. DuMont Laboratories, Inc. It is being operated by DuMont men and members of the staff of WISC.

Both "live" programs, in which spectators can see themselves, and television films are being used.

DISCS OF THE DAY: Art Louny's orchestra makes its Columbia debut with a pair of enjoyable records. One carries "Down by the Old Mill" and "What Do You Mean by Loving Somebody Else" two lively revivals with spirited piano by Louny and good vocals by the Toe-Tappers. The second has "Hold Me in Your Heart," based on "Sorrento," and "Someone Else's Arms." Both feature the piano, with vocals by Peter Hanley.

IN PARIS: Serigraphs by Warrington Colecott, Madison artist, are being displayed in the Galerie Huit in Paris. They are part of a two-man show by Colecott and Charles Boggs, Indiana painter and ceramicist.

MOZART CLUB: With Ralph V. James as director, the Mozart club will start its new season with a rehearsal at 7:45 tonight in the Vocational school. Anthony Farina is club president and Margaret Otterson is accompanist.

NAMES IN THE NEWS: Newest member of the "One Man's Family" cast is Jeanne Cagney, sister of James and Bill, who plays Millicent Prescott.

Cedric Hardwicke will star in and stage a Broadway revival of "No, No, Nanette."

Jose Ferrer will stage three plays in London—"Stalag 17," "The Shrike," and "Cabin in the Sky." Now working on a film, "Moulin Rouge," in England, Ferrer will return to New York next month to direct the road company of "The Shrike," starring Van Heflin.

Mindy Carson will open an engagement Oct. 14 at the Empire room of Milwaukee's Schroeder hotel.

Edward Heth's novel, "If You Lived Here," has been bought by a Broadway producer as the book for a musical. Heth attended the University of Wisconsin. His "Any Number, Can Play" starred Clark Gable on the screen.

Yvonne DeCarlo and **Rock Hudson** are on the island of Jersey for scenes for "Tollers of the Sea," being filmed in color.

Allyn McLerie, who played opposite Ray Bolger in the screen version of "Where's Charley?", has been assigned to a top role in "Calamity Jane" at the Warner studios.

BARBERSHOP SINGING: With the eighth annual "Harvest of Harmony" due Saturday night at East and West high schools, an explanation of barbershop singing is also due. Here it is, from a member of the Madison chorus:

"Barbershop quartet singing is so called because American men many years ago would gather in a barbershop to harmonize in what is now recognized as an outstanding form of folk music.

"The chord is the important thing in barbershop quartet singing, with tempo, rhythm, and even words sacrificed in the interest of close harmony and the satisfaction of fondling a particularly spine-tingling chord.

Later he played the same part opposite Jane Cowl in a stage production. In a long career, Roland has had his ups and downs as perhaps few stars have. He knows it's part of the business, but he's always fought to stay up there.

"Amigo," he says, "let's not kid ourselves. It's great to be a star."

Sabres Report Record 'Kills'

Down 45 MIGs in Past 2 Weeks

TOKYO, (UP)—American F-86 Sabres pilots reported Wednesday they had shot down more enemy MIGs the first two weeks of September than they have in any other month of the Korean War.

The F-86 pilots, using a secret new "gimmick," shot down four MIGs Monday to push the September total to 45 destroyed. They also damaged 40 others, three of them listed as "probably" destroyed.

The September figure of MIGs destroyed actually may be higher. There are unconfirmed claims of four MIGs destroyed, one probably destroyed and five damaged. In addition a U. S. Marine plane shot down a MIG on Sept. 10.


Secretary of Air Thomas F. Finletter made the first mention of the "gimmick" used by the jet pilots, but no details were disclosed. It apparently gives the Sabres superior tactical efficiency over the Communists' prize MIG.

The highest previous toll of Communist planes came last April when a series of air battles over northwest Korea cost the enemy 41 MIGs destroyed.

Atty. MacIntyre Denies Speedboat Violation

Atty. Darrell MacIntyre, 3311 Lake Mendota, dr. pleaded not guilty in Superior Court Tuesday to charges of driving his speedboat over 10 miles per hour within 500 feet of shore and in a marked swimming area of Lake Mendota along the shore between Carroll and Pinckney sts.

He was released on \$25 bail pending trial Sept. 25. The complaint against MacIntyre was signed by Robert Rieser Jr., assistant captain of the University of Wisconsin lifesaving crew.



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
