WHA and WHA-FM Audacious Policy Seeking Liberation Proposed by Wiley

NEW YORK, (UP)—Sen. Alexander Wiley, top Republican on the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, on Monday urged "audacious policies aimed at eventual liberation of countries behind the Iron Curtain."

The Wisconsin Republican said in an article in Look magazine that the United States should develop a "tough mindedness" and "boldly" seize the initiative in choosing the ground of action in the struggle against Communism.

In what he called "my plan for a GOP foreign policy," Wiley criticized the policy of "containment" and also denounced Republicans who urge that America be made a " Gibraltar" or "going it alone," calling these false concepts.

He said the nation should do all it can to create a Tito-like revolts in Eastern Europe.

He listed the GOP foreign policy aims as: 1. To keep America secure and out of war by helping to keep the world out of war.

2. To help provide the free world with economic strength and stability, preferably on a free enterprise basis.

3. To cement the political and spiritual bonds among the Western free nations and with the former colonial peoples and to increase our ties of understanding with peoples behind the Iron Curtain.

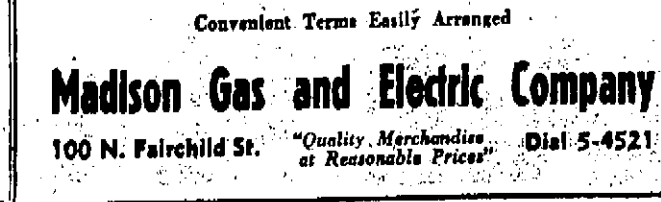

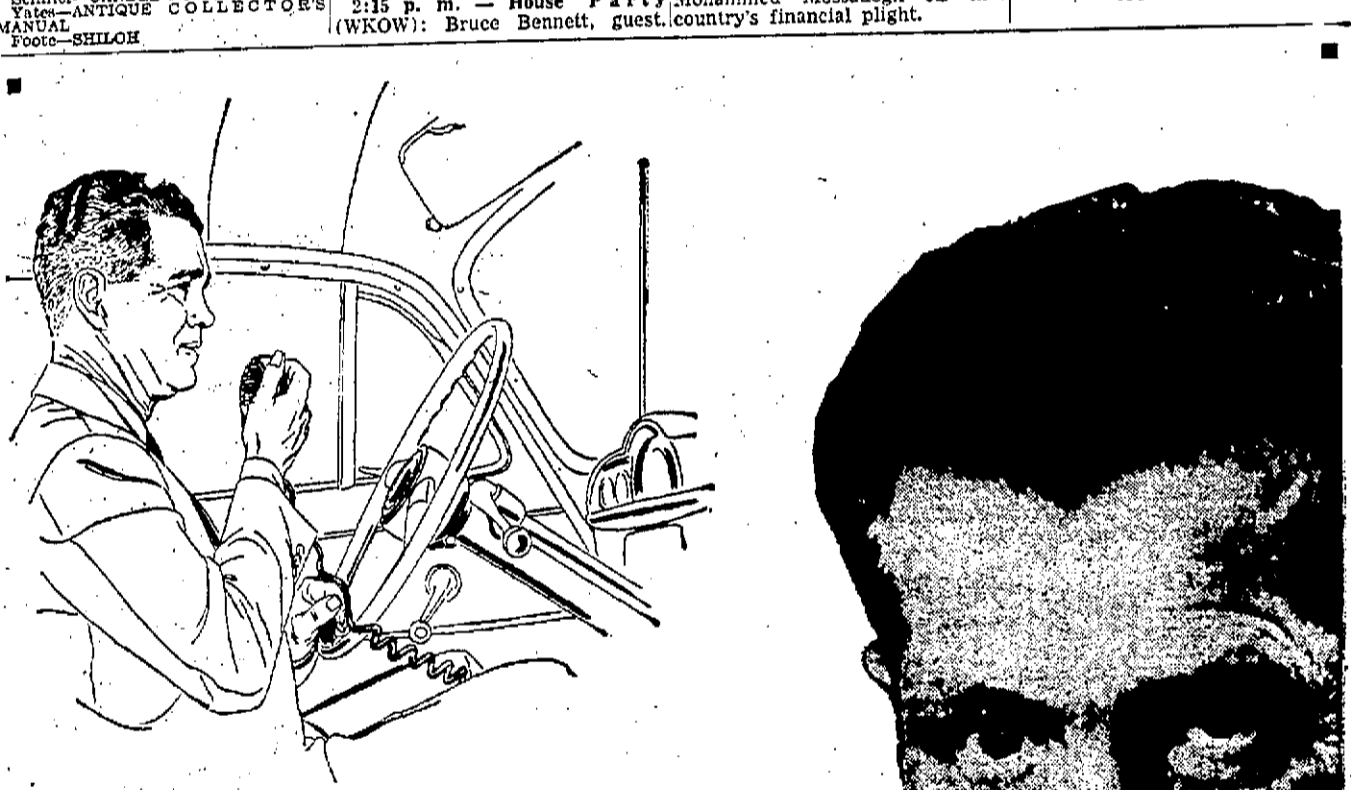
