TOMMY DORSEY, WHOSE music and personality seem to get younger every year, gave himself and his band four workouts at the Orphuem theater Monday. With him were a pair of first-rate vaudeville acts and two singers.

When Dorsey's music is brassy, it's all-out brass, but his showmanship and musicianhip manage to keep it from getting monotonous, for all his arrangements show the value he places on contrast, with subdued passages easing out of the blaring

Sam Donahue, saxophonist, stepped out to star in a couple numbers, notably a sparkling "Body and Soul." Other bandsmen took turns at creditable solos, but it was Dorsey's own work and the ensemble which made the show what it was.

Marietta Knox, a comely lass with oceans of stage presence, was the featured singer, doing "Sunny Side of the Street" and "A Guy Is a Buy." A lad named Hudson showed a promising baritone voice

in "That Old Black Magic." Joanne Barton's amazing puppets-including an incredible planist-and Mickey Sharp's impersonations compelted the bill. His Harry Truman take off was easily his best.



### 'Audacious' Policy Seeking Liberation Proposed by Wiley

NEW YORK, (UP) - Sen. Alexander Wiley, top Republican on the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, on Monday urged "audacious policies simed at eventual liberation of countries behind the

Iron Curtain." The Wisconsin Republican said in an article in Look magazine that the United States should develop a "tough mindedness" and "boldly" seiz the initiative in choosing the ground of action in the struggle against Communism.

In what he called "my plan for a GOP foreign policy," Wiley criticized the policy of "contain-ment" and also denounced Republicans who urge that America be made a "Gibraltar" or "going it alone," calling these false concepts. He said the nation should do all

it can to create Tito-like revolts in Eastern Europe.

He listed the GOP foreign policy




