

BOB HOPE: Under a contract just signed with NBC, Bob Hope will do two sets of programs for the network. He'll have a 15-minute show each morning, Monday through Friday, and a half-hour program at 9 p. m. Wednesdays. The daytime series will start Nov. 10, the night show Jan. 7.

MUSIC FOR GERMANY: Engineers from WHA, the University of Wisconsin station, will go to Waukesha on Oct. 21 to record the first 1952-53 concert of the Waukesha Symphony orchestra. The recording will be shipped to Germany for broadcast from a station at Freiburg.

The concert will be dedicated to 800-year-old Freiburg. And later in the season the orchestra of the Freiburg Academy of Music will record a concert for century-old Waukesha, to be sent here for broadcast on WHA and the state network.

The exchange is a part of Waukesha's centennial celebration, and an acknowledgment of the state's cultural inheritance from Europe.

Frank Glazer, Wisconsin-born pianist, will be soloist in the Waukesha concert.

Here's how the exchange came about:

Last spring Dr. Karl Otto Kloppe, astronomer and physicist from Freiburg, was working at Yerkes observatory in Williams Bay. He became interested in Waukesha's symphony and decided to build and maintain the orchestra. He asked, when he left Williams Bay to return to his own observatory, that an article about the city and its orchestra be sent to him in Freiburg. He wanted to have it published in the German newspapers as a revealing story of life and music in a small American city.

Some people in Waukesha, last summer, were thinking of ways in which the orchestra could celebrate the centennial of the city. Why not dedicate a concert to a European city, since Europe is the background of most Waukeshans? Naturally they thought of their friend in Freiburg. They were met with enthusiastic response from Freiburg, and arrangements were made in detail.

State Confirms Record Primary

Election Turnout Set at 951,205

The Wisconsin senatorial primary this month brought out a record 951,205 votes, a good 300,000 more than usual, the secretary of state's office reported Thursday afternoon.

Republican candidates, headed by U. S. Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy, got almost 80 per cent of the total, and McCarthy alone polled 515,481 votes.

Compiled for Canvassers

The vote for other state offices, most of which were uncontested in both parties, was 75,000 to 100,000 below the senatorial total.

The figures were compiled Thursday in preparation of the official approval by the state board of canvassers, which may meet today.
