

TIP O' THE MORNING: "Oklahoma!" will return to Milwaukee for eight performances at the Davidson theater, starting Oct. 20.

WEDNESDAY'S "DINNERBELL Time" on WLS, Chicago, will be broadcast from Madison. Della Louni and Arthur C. Page will conduct the program from the annual directors' conference of the Wisconsin Council of Agriculture at Hotel Loraine.

During the broadcast, Page will present a gavel made of Wisconsin maple to the council chairman—a gift he promised last year.

MEMORIAL: A week-long memorial to Victor Hugo, French writer, will begin today on the University of Wisconsin campus.

The university library will exhibit manuscripts, first editions, and iconography of Hugo today through Friday. Similar material will be displayed in the French reading room, 269 Bascom hall.

The first part of the original French movie version of "Les Miserables," starring Harry Baur, will be shown at 7:30 tonight in 165 Bascom hall. At the same hour Tuesday, the second part will be shown on the same screen. These will be open to the public.

At 4:30 p.m. Tuesday, WHA will broadcast a program on the life of Hugo, recorded in England. At 4:30 p.m. Thursday, the station will air a special commemorative program recorded in Paris with the collaboration of actors from the Theatre Francais.

Le Cercle Francais, campus organization, will conduct a "soiree Victor Hugo" at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday in the French house, with readings, dramatizations, and songs from Hugo's works.

An address by Rene de Messieres, conseiller culture of France in the U. S., will climax the week. He will speak at 8 p.m. Thursday in the Play Circle on "Les Grandes Crises de la Vie de Victor Hugo."

CHICAGO SYMPHONY: The Chicago Symphony orchestra will open its series of Milwaukee concerts at 8:15 p.m. next Monday in the Pabst theater. Frank Glazer, Wisconsin-born pianist, will be soloist. George Schick will conduct.

The orchestra will play five times this week in Chicago's Orchestra hall.

Schick will conduct Young People's concerts at 8:15 tonight and at 2:15 p.m. Tuesday, with Rochelle Liebling, 13-year-old pianist, as soloist.

The first Chicago performance of Honnegger's fifth symphony will be on the programs which Rafael Kubelik will conduct at 8:15 p.m. Thursday and 2:15 p.m. Friday.

Ruth Tengwall, young Chicago violinist, will be soloist at the popular concert at 8:15 p.m. Saturday. Kubelik will conduct.

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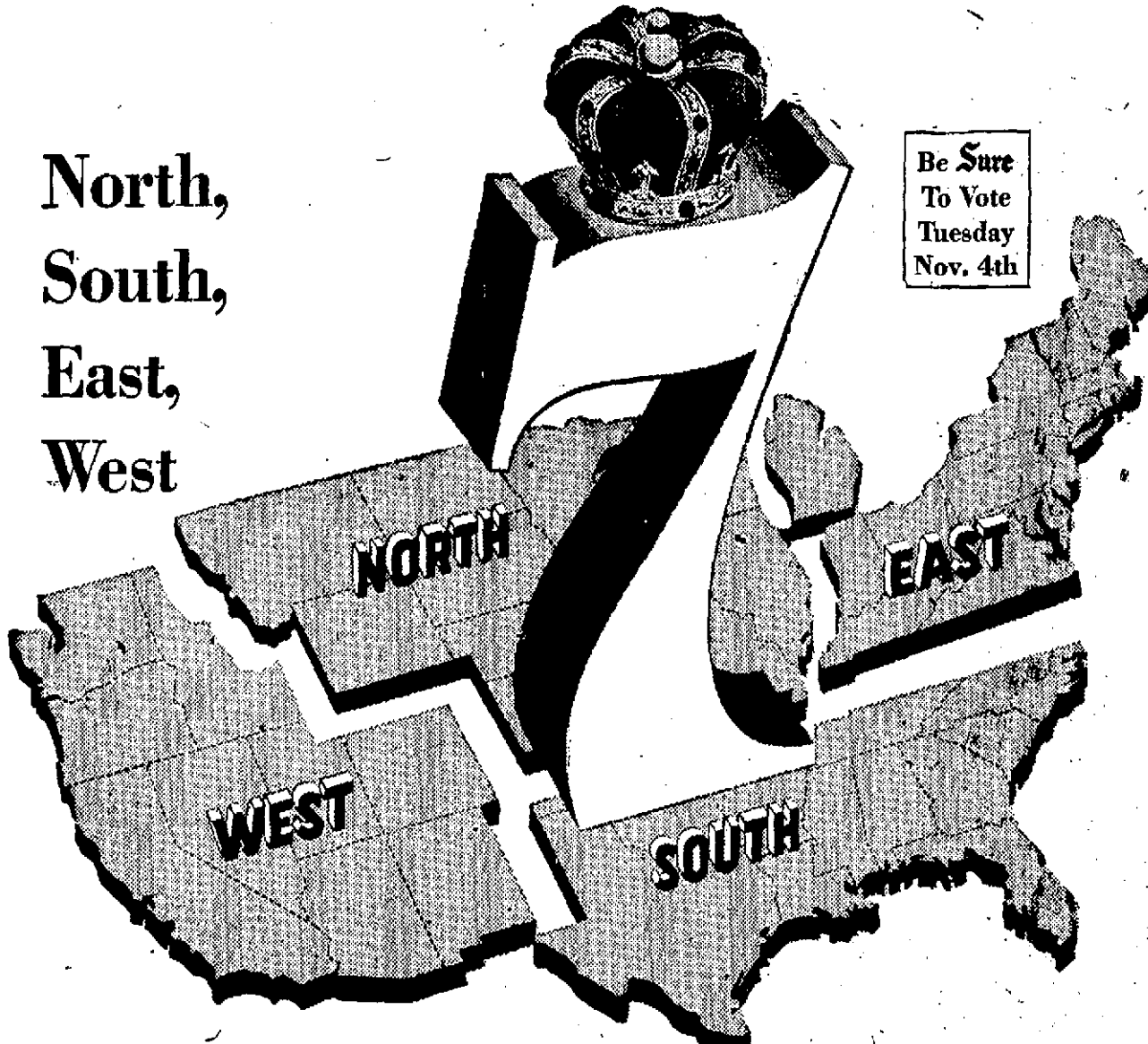

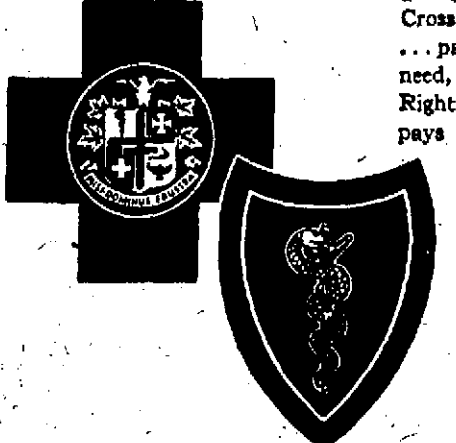
