Bill Douglas's SPOTLIGHT Jazz Concert

TIP OF THE MORNING: Election coverage is beginning to shape up. WISC will carry ABC's network show from 7 p. m. into the night, with city, county, and state returns interpolated in the last five minutes of each half-hour, starting at 7:25.

BATTLE FOR APPLAUSE between two of the nation's top jazz drummers—Gene Krupa and Buddy Rich—eliminated "Jazz at the Philharmonic" Thursday at the Wisconsin Union theater and sent two audiences home filled with excitement or wonder, as the case might be.

The excitement was reflected in the handclapping and shouting with which most of the listeners greeted the collection of jazz artists, most of them tops in their lines. The wonder was in the minds of those who haven't quite caught up with current trends, which seems to be a post-bop return to less stylized playing.

The drum-beating exhibition served also to point up the fact that the enthusiasm such things generate comes from visual rather than aural pleasure—it isn't so much what is heard as what is seen. And these two men showed plenty of agility and skill.

The phenomenal piano playing of Oscar Peterson, who makes it look so easy, and the seductive voice of Ella Fitzgerald were the show's high spots for the in-between listener—the one who neither adores nor deplores such goings-on. Miss Fitzgerald has several admirable qualities, among them a true sense of pitch and beat, a marvelous control of her voice, a wholesome respect for melody and harmony, and a huskiness which can be turned on or off as occasion asks.

Trumpeters Charlie Shavers and Ray Eldridge and pianist Peterson starred in the opening section, a jam session which also presented the talents of Flip Phillips and Lester Young, tenor saxophonist; Ray Brown, bass; Barney Kessel, guitar, and Peterson.

This was a parade of ingenious and infinite variations, marked by the spontaneity which is the heart of jazz. More of the same appeared with the Peterson trio—Oscar, Kessel, and Brown—and less with the work of the Krupa trio—Gene, Hank Jones at the piano, and Bill Smith at the sax. In this segment, one felt the music was planned and rehearsed, the effects calculated.

ART SALON: About \$1,000 in awards and purchase prizes will be offered at the 18th annual Wisconsin Salon of Art, says the prospectus mailed this week. The show will open with a reception and awarding of prizes at 8 p. m. Nov. 19 in the Memorial Union. Public showing will be Nov. 20 through Dec. 14.

THEATER GUILD: Leading roles in "First Lady," opening bill of the Madison Theater Guild season, will be played by Ann Bjork, as a state secretary; Margot Herriott, as a scheming social climber; Ronald C. Gee, as a sedate secretary of state, and Mildred E. Wirka, as his wife.

Director Al Barraclough has also announced these players for other roles: Louis Rapoport, Connie Connor, Miriam Tenney, Phoebe H. Schlager, Marilyn Meissner, Carol Johnson, Joan Barraclough, Eleanor Grant, Ralph DeSha, Norris E. Maloney, Dolores Lenahan, James A. McQuire, Julius M. Sparkman, Ray Lenahan, and Jack Tremblay, Jr.

The play will be presented Thursday and Friday, Nov. 6 and 7, at East high school and Saturday, Nov. 8, at West high school.

NEWS IN BRIEF: Arturo Toscanini will open the 1952-53 season of the NBC Symphony orchestra Saturday, Nov. 1. He will conduct 14 concerts, and Guido Cantelli will conduct eight.

Two one-act plays and a dance interlude will be presented by the Wisconsin Union theater committee and Wisconsin Players in the Play Circle of the Memorial Union next week. Orchestral and variety dance organization, will give the interlude. The plays will be "A Phoenix Too Frequent" by Christopher Fry, and "Incident at Vichy" by John Warner.

"Ivanhoe," highly praised film from the Scott novel, will open Oct. 22 at the Capitol theater.

Don Voegel's orchestra will play for Harefoot Follies, annual cabaret-style dance set for Friday, Oct. 31, in Great hall of the Memorial Union. Dave Weiner is chairman.
