

# The Sunday Spotlight Route to Exquisite Suite

Radio folk are likely to boast about their great influence on American speech. They're right, too. They have a tremendous influence. In fact, radio is gradually breaking down the difference of regional inflection and pronunciation.

But if we grant that radio has this influence, then I think that we should demand that it use its power for the good of the language. The industry from the smallest independent station to the greatest network, should insist upon correct usage and correct pronunciation.

In the past week, there have been many violations—not all of them the direct fault of the announcer or even the station.

One of the most frequent mispronunciations is that of the word "route." According to the dictionaries in this office, it should be "root," to rhyme with "boot." But usually we hear it on the air as "rhoyt" with an "s" sound. True, the dictionaries recognize the latter as a colloquialism—but one that confines it to the military and another notes that "root" is now more widely accepted.

On one station, the only place I have heard it said correctly in the last few days is on a farm program (except for network shows).

Another mangled word is "suite," referring to furniture. All sources say this should be pronounced "sweet." Yet an advertiser on one Madison station insists that announcers say "sueit." True, this is common in the furniture trade. The station, in this case, tried to sell the correct pronunciation, but the advertiser was adamant, so you'll hear men talking about a "Sueit" of furniture.



Still another common error is the wrong accenting of "exquisite." The stress should be on the first syllable, not the second.
