Groucho wrote: "On a recent broadcast of my show, 'You Bet Your Life,' I asked a young couple the following question: 'In Shakespeare's 'Henry IV,' 'Henry V' and 'Merry Wives of Windsor' there appears a cowardly braggart whose good humor and wit have endeared him to millions the world over. For \$1,000, I want you to identify this genial fellow.' The couple answered 'Pistol.' I said that was incorrect; the correct answer is 'Falstaff.' There is \$1,000 at stake.

"After the show was broadcast, the couple, who had done some research on the subject, challenged our disposition of the question, charging that Pistol does appear in all three plays and Falstaff does not, and therefore they are entitled to the money.

"We replied that since Pistol could not be called a 'cowardly braggart' whose good humor and wit have endeared him to millions,' we could not agree that Pistol was the correct answer and therefore felt they were not entitled to the money.

"We also pointed out that while Falstaff does not appear in the theater a character can appear in a play without necessarily making an appearance on stage, and that therefore Falstaff does appear in all three plays.

"I'm asking you as a qualified authority on the subject, to help us out of the technical dilemma. If I had asked you the original question, what would have been your answer? And are we right or wrong?"
