Major Campaigners Total 1,000 Speeches

WASHINGTON (AP) — Major campaigners traveled more than 150,000 miles to deliver more than 1,000 speeches in this year's presidential race.

Statistics, assembled from campaign headquarters, show that: Dwight D. Eisenhower — traveled about 33,000 miles, mostly by special train, and made some 228 speeches.

Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson — Traveled 25,770 miles by plane and 4,842 miles by train to make 107 speeches.

Sen. Richard M. Nixon — Traveled 42,000 miles to deliver 181 speeches.

Sen. John J. Sparkman — Traveled 36,000 miles, largely by plane, and made 400 speeches.

President Truman — Traveled 18,000 miles on his own campaign train and delivered more than 200 speeches for the Stevenson-Sparkman ticket.

Madison Stations Schedule Extensive Election Coverage

Election reports and analyses from all four major networks will be broadcast by Madison stations beginning at 7 tonight. Before that, early returns will be aired in bulletin form and in regular newscasts.

All networks except Mutual will turn over the last five minutes of each half-hour to their local outlets for reports on state, county, and city voting; Mutual will permit three-minute summaries at the end of each half-hour.

In addition, some stations will leave the network briefly during the evening to bring extended summaries of particular interest here and for other programs.

All the stations plan to stay on the air beyond their usual sign-off times and until elections appear to be definite.

The National Broadcasting Co. reports will be on WIBA and WJCF-FM. Reports from Radio Paris and the Dane county courthouse also will be broadcast at 6:25, 10 and 11 p. m., with bulletins mingled with music on the "1310 Club" at 11:05 p. m.

"Sports Final" will be on the air at 9:55. Jim Mader will report from the courthouse and Jack Bainter and Roger Foster will be at the studio microphones.

WKOW will carry returns from the Columbia Broadcasting System (CBS). Jack Davis will broadcast studio summaries and Ray Streeter will report from the courthouse.

Pre-network reports will be broadcast at 6 and 6:40 p. m. Returns from the American Broadcasting Co. will be on WISC and WJCF-FM. Ralph O'Connor and John McGehean will cover state returns at the studios and Henry Buslee will report city and county voting from the courthouse.

O'Connor also will report Wisconsin results on both ABC and Mutual.

WJCF will air Mutual Broadcasting System (MBS) coverage, plus studio summaries by Earl Warren, Bill Leppien, and Joe Benton on state, city, and county balloting. A special five-minute summary will be broadcast from the studios at 8 p. m. and "Sharpen Your Wits," abbreviated to 15

minutes, will go on the air at 9. WJCF-FM will originate state FM network summaries from 9 to 10:50, with music interspersed among reports. These stations will sign off at their usual time—11 p. m.—after a 10-minute news summary.
