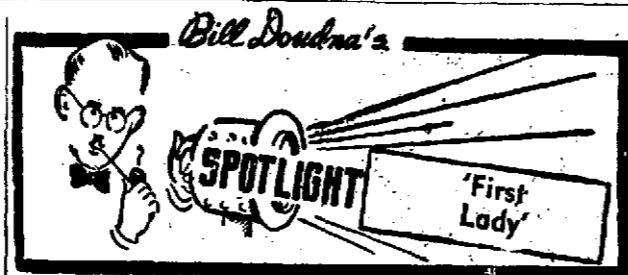

TIP OF THE MORNING: Rosalind Russell has signed a contract to star on Broadway in the musical version of "My Sister Eileen"—a move reported several weeks ago. This will be her first New York show since she went to Hollywood in 1934.

"FIRST LADY," a satire on how presidents are made, opened the Madison Theater Guild's new season Thursday night at East high school. It will be repeated there at 8:15 tonight and at West high school at 8:15 p. m. Saturday.

This was a story to prove that it takes brains as well as unheated claws to win a battle between two political paragers—female, that is.

In "First Lady," the battlers were Lucy Chase Wayne, granddaughter of a president who never let anybody forget Grandpa's political know-how, and Irene Hibbard, flamboyant wife of a fust-budget who, with the help of her money, climbed to the Supreme Court bench.

Mildred Wirka played Mrs. Wayne, who almost incidentally was the wife of the secretary of state, and Margot Herriott was her opponent in this war of wits and conversational nastiness.

Both were first-rate, but one scene gave Mrs. Herriott the edge. It was a piece of pantomime at the beginning of the second act which revealed, better than the subsequent conversation, how this lever of good clothes and good times had come to despise her incredibly dull husband.

The story told how Mrs. Wayne, trying to get the nomination for a young senator, outsmarted herself and almost put her rival in the White House, then uncovered two bits of information which put herself on the path to it.

Sharp dialog, acting which for the most part was smooth and human, and sufficient suspense kept the play interesting and lively until the very end, when it suddenly slumped.

Besides Mrs. Wirka and Mrs. Herriott, standouts in the cast were Connie Connor as a heavily-accented Mississippi gal; Ronald C. Gee as the sincere, hard-working secretary of state; Eleanor R. Grant as a clubwoman whom Lucy used as a tool in her plot; Norris Maloney as a cynical and somewhat caustic politician; and Miriam Tenney as a veteran of the Washington women's wars.

The two settings were highly commendable.

"MR. ROBERTS": Tod Andrews, who will play the title role here in "Mr. Roberts," is one of those actors whose career began because of an understanding teacher.

This has been the case with many performers, but Tod's was a little different in detail.

In school as a boy, he found it almost impossible to speak to an audience. To cure him, a wise instructor had him act out stories in pantomime. And he found himself interested in acting.

Things went along so well that soon he found himself virtually a professional, directing and acting in one-act plays at Los Angeles movie houses. The pay was \$2 per actor per performance.

At Washington State college, Andrews studied speech, dramatics, and journalism. After graduation, he went to the Pasadena Playhouse for two years as a fellowship student, and there appeared in 15 plays.

His professional career started in "Quiet Please," which was a success in Los Angeles but a failure in New York. Once on Broadway, Andrews decided to stay there. He got his first big break as the admiral in "My Sister Eileen," a part which led to a two-year stay in Hollywood.

Since then he has played in New York and in stock, had the leading role in "Summer and Smoke" at the premiere in Dallas and on the road, and has been busy in television.

This is his third season on the road with "Mr. Roberts." The play will be at the Parkway theater for three performances Nov. 21 and 22.

IN WASHINGTON: Two paintings by Dean Meeker, University of Wisconsin art education professor, are on exhibit in the IFA gallery, Washington, D. C., in a small show of serigraphs by American artists.

The prints were chosen to represent a broad range of technical approaches, according to Leslie J. Porter, art critic for the Washington Post.

"Among the most interesting are those of Dean Meeker," Porter wrote. "His 'Still Life,' an abstraction in glowing colors where

intensity and luminosity are playing like music in crescendo, is one of the handsomest pieces in the show. The picture 'Everybody Has His Own Act' is a biting commentary, which uses overlapping planes and subtly divided composition to tell its story."

Meeker came to the University of Wisconsin in 1947. Prior to that, he had studied at the Chicago Art Institute and at Northwestern university. His wife also is an artist who has exhibited widely in recent years.

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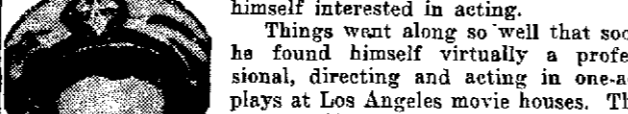
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
