



TIP OF THE MORNING: Radio and television fans will find lots of fun and information in "Out of the Blue," a collection of John Crosby's columns just published in book form.

A MAGNIFICENT performance of Brahms' "Piano Quartet in A Major" by Prof. Leo Steffens, pianist, and three members of the Pro Arte quartet climaxed the opening of the quartet's Music Hall season Sunday night.

Steffens, as he always is, was a perfect complement for the string players — Rudolf Kolisch, violin; Bernard Milofsky, viola, and Ernst Friedlander, cello.

The work opens quietly, but its first movement soon assumes a magnitude almost symphonic. As the quartet develops, it becomes again real chamber music, with an impassioned second movement, a vigorous scherzo, and highly rhythmic finale filled with melody.

The program opened with Mozart's only work for violin, viola, and cello, his "Divertimento in E Flat Major." In classic form, it is rich with diversity, especially in the variations between two minuetts in the very center of the work.

The three men played with their usual cohesiveness, but there was an occasional roughness in the violin and viola—or perhaps it was only a momentary lapse from the purity to which these musicians have accustomed us.

Arnold Schoenberg's one-movement "String Trio, Opus 45" completed the program.

Schoenberg's music affects one differently each time he hears it—whether it is the same piece or a different one from the last he listened to. This time, it appeared to be a mixture of harmonics, pizzicatos, glissandos, and other string tricks interrupted by passages of haunting and tantalizing beauty.

The next time, probably, these would be the focus of attention.

Nationalists Say Men Haven't Entered Burma

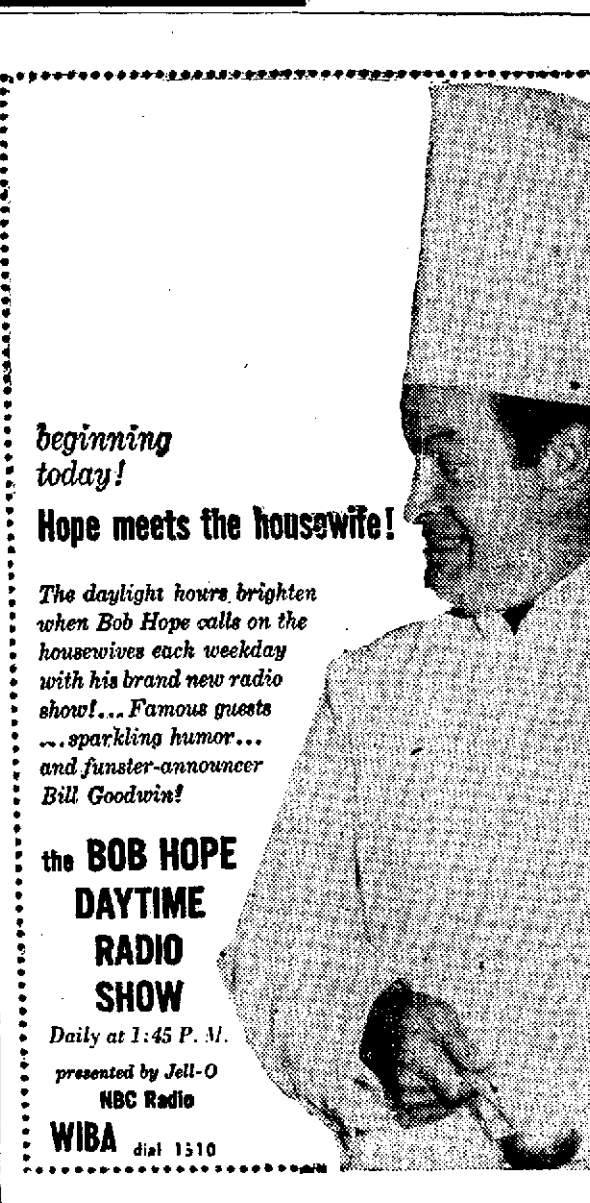
TAIPEH, Formosa (AP)—A Rangoon report that Chinese Nationalist troops trained in Thailand had entered Burma was denied Monday by Gen. Cheng Kai-Min, deputy chief of the Nationalist general staff and chief of guerrilla activities on the Red China mainland.

The Rangoon report, he said, might have resulted from Nationalist guerrilla operations in the Yunnan area of China near the border of Burma.
