



TIP O' THE MORNING: It's a good bet that the record novelty hit of the 1952 Christmas season will be "I Saw Mommy Kissing Santa Claus" as sung for Columbia by 12-year-old Jimmy Boyd.

A WITTY and adult comedy-drama by John Van Druten, enacted by a cast diligent in recreating the shifting moods and changing personalities of the play, opened Tuesday night at the Wisconsin Union theater. It was "Old Acquaintance," presented by Wisconsin Players and directed by Prof. John Dietrich.

"Old Acquaintance" is neither the fluff, sexy farce of "The Voice of the Turtle" nor the enduring tragic-comedy of "I Remember Mama." It is something in between these Van Druten plays—a comedy of friendship, of extra-marital love, of young dreams and older ones, all touched with pathos.

It is the story of a novelist, Katherine Markham, who at 45 decides to marry her 29-year-old lover but who loses him to the 18-year-old daughter of her closest friend. You may think the review overemphasizes these ages, but they are important to the story.

Donna Wenger's performance as the youngest member of the triangle was a polished one, yet completely sincere and credible. Embittered first by her mother's attempt to control her life and then by the discovery of the affair between the novelist — whom she idolized—and the man she loves, this girl grew up overnight, and Miss Wenger made it wholly believable.

Margaret Urban was stage-wise and poised as the sophisticated writer, dominant in every scene (in spite of a distracting over-use of her hands). She made every barbed line count for a laugh.

Don Phelps' man in the case grew up, too, with his acceptance of his new love. One could feel the struggle in him as he sought a way to tell Katherine of his change of heart.

Joy Kelly played the mother, also a novelist, for the self-satisfied, eternally jealous, and selfish woman this Mildred was. Lloyd Tripp had a brief scene, but good, as her matter-of-fact ex-husband.

Dietrich, as always, kept the pace steady, the actors on their toes, especially in scenes between the two long-time friends.

The settings reflected the temperaments of the two writers—Katherine's smart and functional, Mildred's cluttered and sentimental.

The play will be repeated at 8 tonight and at 8 p. m. Thursday, Friday, and Saturday.

N. C. Negro Convicted of Assault by 'Leering'
YANCEYVILLE, N. C. (AP)—An all-white jury convicted Negro sharecropper Mack Ingram Tuesday of assault by "leering" at a young white girl at a distance of 50 feet.
The jury of rural farmers took only 58 minutes to convict the lanky, 45-year-old father of nine children under a law which provides that actual physical contact has no bearing on assault if the defendant intended harm.
Under the conviction, Ingram faces a prison sentence up to two
