 Paintings by Bulman

TIP OF THE MORNING: Dr. B. M. Duggar, former University of Wisconsin faculty member and discoverer of aureomycin, will be guest in the "Family Counselor" segment of "The Second Mrs. Burton" over CBS-WBBM at 1 p. m. Wednesday.

CERTAIN THINGS a painter must have: A sure acquaintance with his medium and its tools; something to say or a story to tell; imagination and the ability to convey its intent to others; a feel for composition and color.

Above all, he must have the urge for creation, just as writers and musicians must have it.

Orville Bulman got that urge six years ago, and for half of each year since he has devoted himself to oils and canvas. Some of the results went on view Wednesday night at Scandan hall, where they will be on public exhibition through Nov. 25.

Bulman is the president of a manufacturing firm in Grand Rapids, Mich., who started as a "Sunday painter." His formal schooling has been brief, but his work shows him to be a man with great powers of absorption and the ability to turn what he absorbs to his own uses.

Here you will find no abstractions, although one picture—"All the Houses"—has the appeal of good non-objective painting in its strong emphasis on design and feeling. Here you will find no surrealism, although "Voodoo in the Sky" has its surrealistic aspect with grotesque dancers floating above highlighted Haitian dancers.

Neither will you find the primitive, although the stark outlines and the naive grouping of its characters put the marks of the primitive painter on "Cousin Charlotte."

What you will find are these things: An intuitive sense of proportion and design in such paintings as "Houses" and "Big Bookie, Little Bookie," with the shapes of houses in the background emphasized by a box carried by a figure in the foreground;

A vivid handling of light, as in the harsh glare of "Voodoo in the Sky," the tropic heat of "Big Bookie," and the appearance of phosphorescence in "Charivari";

A humor in almost every picture, sometimes subtle and sometimes broad, as in the scurrying miniatures of "Tempe d'Haiti";

Contrasts between the broad scope of a landscape and the intimate texture of pieces of wood;

Studies of disintegration in "Welcome Home" and "White Moon." Quiet fun in a boy's launching a paper airplane into the dark in "Night Flight," and joviality in the careening bus of "Into Town."

Most of all, one comes away from this show with a sense of the painter's urgency, which is tempered by warmth and skill.

SALON AWARDS: For the first time in the history of the Wisconsin Salon of Art, awards will exceed \$1,000 this year. Thus far, purchase prizes and awards for the 18th annual show total \$1,075, according to Mary Demeter, Milwaukee, award chairman for the Wisconsin Union gallery committee.

Last year's total of \$940 set a record over all previous Salons. The list of donors and awards includes:

The Milwaukee Sentinel cash award of \$50 in oil; Gimbel Brothers, Milwaukee, two cash awards of \$25 each in sculpture; anonymous cash award of \$50 in oil; the Oscar Rennebohm \$25 cash award; the Ed Schuster and Co. \$25 award; Harold S. Falk award of \$15; and the Mrs. Walter Els purchase award of \$10 for the Wisconsin Union loan collection.

Judging of the Salon entries will begin Saturday and will be completed Sunday. Announcement of the award winners will be made Wednesday at a preview reception at 8 p. m. in the Union. The show will open to the public Nov. 20 and will be shown in the main gallery, the lounge, and the theater gallery of the Union.
