'Pop' Concert

TIP OF THE MORNING: The weekly "Agricultural Achievement Award," given on NBC-WIBA at 7 a. m. Saturdays, will go this week to Norbert Nuttelman, West Salem.

A CONCERT OF GREAT popular appeal, performed with skill and affection, introduced the 1952-53 versions of the University of Wisconsin Symphony orchestra and a Cappella choir to a capacity audience in the Wisconsin Union theater Sunday night. The appeal was so great, in fact, that many persons were unable to find tickets available.

Dvorak's "New World," one of the three or four most popular symphonies, made up the program's first half.

Familiar for its own sake as well as for the widespread use of its large in choral arrangements, the work is easy to listen to largely because of the composer's plain statement of his themes and their frequent reiteration. While Dvorak used no actual American melodies, he gave the symphony a feeling more American than Bohemian. (There is, however, a touch of "Yankee Doodle" in variation in a viola passage of the finale.)

The orchestra showed itself capable of fine playing, much of which it displayed in the opening movement and the dramatic finale. But necessary precision slipped a bit in the rollicking scherzo, and there was some loose intonation.

Nevertheless, for an opening concert this was a good exhibition of student talent.

The second half more than made up for the missing qualities—exceptional intonation in the Barber "Adagio for Strings," with its deeply emotional passages, and cue-perfect work on Gershwin's "Rhapsody in Blue."

George Becker, graduate student from Stoughton, was the soloist. He played with great sonority, secure fingering, and an appreciation of Gershwin, especially the "bluer" portions of the work. Clarinetist David Boyd was in the groove, and "wa-wa" trumpets and trombones recreated the '20s well.

Romberg tunes completed the program, with the choir—which had been trained by J. Russell Paxton—singing the well-loved airs. The group had remarkable depth and first-rate diction, plus the variety of approach demanded by these marching songs and love songs.

Of the four soloists, Soprano Jane Bandy and Mezzo-Soprano Helen Starr showed the most mature voices, Miss Starr the best-projected. The others were Alan Prisk, tenor, and Lawrence McCormick, baritone.

STUDIO PLAY: The Wisconsin Union theater committee and Wisconsin Players will present a studio production of "The Glass Menagerie" Tuesday and Wednesday in the Play Circle.

NAMES IN THE NEWS: When Arturo Toscanini conducts a concert performance of the second act of "Orpheus and Eurydice" over NBC-WIBA Saturday night, the soloists will be Nan Merriman and Barbara Gibson.

Robert Crane, a member of the faculty of the University of Wisconsin school of music, has received a grant from the university research committee which will permit him to work full-time next summer on a composition of a cantata, "Peter Quince at the Clavier." Crane holds a bachelor degree from Oberlin college, a diploma from the Longy School of Music, and a doctorate from the University of Rochester.

Gene Nelson will have his first non-dancing role when he co-stars in "Don't Cry, Baby" with Phyllis Kirk.

Carl Eppert, 70-year-old Milwaukee composer, will be represented on the program which the Chicago Symphony orchestra will play tonight at the Pabst theater, Milwaukee. The work will be "Escapade."

Uta Hagen's starring vehicle, "In Any Language," was scheduled to close its Broadway run Saturday night after 45 performances.

Jean Bennett and Zachary Scott will take "Bell, Book, and Candle," by John Van Druten, to Milwaukee's Davidson theater for the week of Dec. 1



Kenosha Man Dies From Shotgun Blast
 KENOSHA (AP)—Pasquale Caracciola, 58, died Sunday shortly after his son-in-law's 16-gauge shotgun discharged accidentally and wounded him in the chest. Caracciola was hunting near Powers Lake in western Kenosha County with Darrell Litten, 23, Chicago, and Carmen Surione, a neighbor of Caracciola's. Coroner William Rauen said Litten told him all three men had shot at a rabbit and that he had just finished reloading when the weapon discharged and wounded his father-in-law.

Ohio Officer to Fill Allied Staff Position
 NAPLES, Italy (AP)—Maj. Gen. Clovis E. Byers of Columbus, O., World War II paratrooper and a former corps commander in Korea and Japan, arrived here Sunday to become chief of staff to Adm. Robert B. Carney, Allied commander-in-chief, Southern Europe. He replaces another paratrooper, Maj. Gen. James Gavi who is leaving to take command of the U. S. Seventh Corps in Stuttgart, Germany.

Moscow Paper Claims U.S. Destroying Mail
 MOSCOW (AP)—The government news paper Ivestia Sunday charged U. S. postal authorities with confiscation of Soviet publications enroute to U. S. subscribers. A U. S. Postoffice departmental spokesman said in New York last week that it has been allowing Soviet bloc periodicals to go through to some universities and researchers, while destroying materials addressed to others without notice to the addressees.
