Fifteen months of his sea duty was spent with the 7th Task Force operating in Korean coastal waters. Loy had served a year of active duty with the Navy from February, 1949, to February, 1950, and was released to inactive duty for 10 months before being recalled in December, 1950.

He is eligible for discharge in three weeks. A 1948 graduate of East High school, Loy attended the University of Wisconsin before enlisting in the Navy.

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
