The Wisconsin Salon of Art

By DR. D. ALEXANDER SEVERINO, Assistant Professor of Art Education, University of Wisconsin. Statistically speaking, the current Wisconsin Salon of Art at the Memorial Union is a success. Over 300 entries in a variety of art media were received, and it remained for the jury composed of Hugo Weber, Hulda Curl, and Max Kahn, to distribute over \$1,000 of prize money among approximately 100 finalists.

James Wachholz's "The Medium" receives the Wisconsin Union Purchase prize of \$100. In this encaustic painting the young artist creates an interesting, if moody, pattern. "The Medium" lacks sufficient visual and tactile unity to make it completely successful as a design. Of considerable interest is the encaustic, "Continuation," in which Donald Weiden achieves a fine adjustment of forms, both aesthetic and literal, to express his idea in a long horizontal composition.

Perhaps the most expressive use of the medium is represented in Earl Gesser's dramatic "City Hall." There are many fine entries in the graphic arts—these include etchings, lithographs, woodcuts, wood engravings, and serigraphs. It is hoped that additional prize money will be made available in the future for these works. Fuller Griffith's "Quartet," a low-key wood engraving, wins the Harold S. Falk Purchase prize of \$15 for the Wisconsin Union loan collection.

Dr. Michael Andrews' "Mary" is a well-composed and well-executed marble head possessing considerable art value. Charlotte Aronson's marble semi-abstract, "Figure," is notable for the interesting rhythms of volumes maintained within the larger sculptured mass. For your reviewer, too much of the remaining sculpture is rootless and shallow; the materials are not used imaginatively or to best advantage and concepts are stereotyped.

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Uncle Ray's Corner Pliny Described Queer Ideas

One of the great Romans of long ago is known in history as Pliny, or Pliny the Elder. The latter name was given to set him apart from a relative. Pliny lived during the time of Roman emperors, from Trajan to Titus. He died when he was only 56 years of age, but he packed a great deal into his life. His career came to an end when he went too close to the exploding Mount Vesuvius.

Pliny turned to the writing of the best known work of his life, known as his "History of Nature" or "Natural History." Here he gave thousands of notes about animals, plants, minerals, weather and the lights of the sky. We are told that he would perform his public duties early in the morning, then would turn to reading and writing. He kept on writing late into the night. This man was an earnest student and a clever writer. He liked to discover "marvelous things," and then to tell about them in his books. If such a man lived today, he probably would have enjoyed producing "curiosity cartoons."
