**SPOTLIGHT**  
Theater in Miniature

**TIP O' THE MORNING:** Broadcasts of Metropolitan Opera Co. performances will begin Saturday over the ABC network with "La Forza del Destino." The season will have 18 Saturday matinee broadcasts.

THOSE ENCHANTING CHARACTERS, the marionettes from Salzburg, charmed another audience of youngsters and adults Sunday afternoon at the Wisconsin Union theater when they performed "Rumpelstiltskin" and a fantasy based on Mozart's "Eine Kleine Nachtmusik."

Formally called the Salzburg Marionette Theater, the attraction was attuned to both classes of spectators, who lost their class-consciousness as the light-hearted show progressed.

The Mozart serenades opened the afternoon as accompaniment for a delightful ballet in which Cupid's golden arrows found their marks on a pair of dancers, who promptly fell in each other's arms. Amid flying cherubims and floating lights, a tiny orchestra appeared to play the first music, then the couple appeared along with other fantastic figures. But Cupid, with his fluttering wings and unerring aim, was the hit of the act.

The marionette version of "Rumpelstiltskin" was filled with fun. There was action all the time, even during songs and spoken lines; it included a couple of knock-down, drag-out battles.

The dolls were amazingly lifelike, especially a playful pooh which stole laundry and carried bundles of straw. The script was beautifully written, and the staging was superb, with lighting, sets, and costumes as nearly perfect as they could be.

**ART BY AIR:** Painting such sounds as a train's rumble, a jet's whirr, a fire engine's siren may sound impossible, but James H. Schwalbach has proved that it can be done. A group of children chosen from the training school at Eau Claire State college helped him.

A tape recording made while the children listened to sounds and finger-painted, to the rhythm pattern will broadcast as part of the Nov. 25 Wisconsin School of the Air "Let's Draw" program, which Schwalbach conducts on the Wisconsin State Broadcasting Service.

The program, planned by Gretchen Grimm, of the college art department, is an actual class in finger-painting with sounds used as the drawing incentive.

Student assistants are Roger De Rusk, Mona Krausehuster, Patricia Dinker, and Jane Olson.

"Let's Draw," now in its 17th year on the air, is a creative radio art course designed for grades school classrooms throughout the state. It is broadcast each Tuesday at 1:30 p. m., primarily for grades 3 to 8, by all stations of Wisconsin's state-wide educational network.

"Art should be the personal expression of the individual child," says Schwalbach, "and should not follow a set pattern. As his personality changes, so does his art. The child's way of drawing is as personal to him as the tilt of his nose. Everyone has an urge to create, but for many competence comes only after experimentation and exploration of the field of art. As in everything else the child learns by doing."

In many schools "Let's Draw" is a supplement to the curriculum, but in others in which there is no established art program it supplies something extra which a classroom teacher without art training cannot be expected to supply.

The series also proves that radio cannot substitute completely for the teacher, Schwalbach says. He has found over the years that the best creative work comes consistently from those schools having teachers who are interested and enthusiastic though not necessarily skilled in art. With the help of a teacher's manual provided by the School of the Air, the children can be prepared beforehand for the weekly broadcast, he points out.

Last year's enrollment figures indicate that approximately 80,000 registrations were recorded by teachers ordering the "Let's Draw" manual. This figure serves as some measure of the success of this creative radio art course.

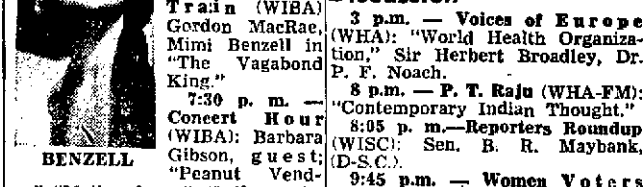
