ABOUT THE SOVIETS: In the belief that the U. S. is going to have to live in the same world with the Soviet Union for many years and that Americans should know all they can about Communism, the National Association of Educational Broadcasters has prepared a new radio series called "People Under Communism." The seven one-hour broadcasts have been designed "to give listeners an insight into important phases of Russian life, propaganda, and political techniques" the association says. The programs were produced under a \$300,000 grant from the Fund for Adult Education established by the Ford Foundation. The first program will be "Terror as a System of Power," the story of the Soviet secret police based on materials provided by Dr. Merle Fainsod of the Russian Research center at Harvard university.
