



TIP OF THE MORNING: The story of the Waukesha Symphony orchestra will be told at intermission time of the New York Philharmonic-Symphony's concert over CBS...

IN MUSIC SOLEMN AND gay, new and old, three University of Wisconsin choruses Sunday greeted the Christmas season with a concert in Luther Memorial church.

Each of the choruses—the A Cappella choir, the Men's chorus, and Women's chorus—had its own choir loft, one at the back of the church and one at each side of the altar.

It was with the combination of all three, whether in the merger of their voices or in antiphonal singing, that the concert was best, although each was excellent in its own right.

The A Cappella choir, directed by J. Russell Paxton, sang a group of contemporary carols by Bethuel Gross which showed most clearly its estimable dynamics and ability to handle unconventional harmonies.

One of the concert's loveliest spots was a mezzo-soprano solo by Helen Starr in "Tres Magi de Genibus;" another was the playing of Gluck's "Intermezzo for Flute and Harp" by Beth Mitchell and Stanley Störger.

Mrs. Paxton was organist; her brief recital before the choir appeared gave most of the listeners their first experience with her musicianship.

The concert ended with a unique and dignified recessional—the choir marching out of the church silently while Mrs. Paxton played Christmas melodies on the organ's chimps.

BAND CONCERT: Handsome and husky Leonard B. Smith, Detroit bandmaster, lived up to his avowed billing as one of the nation's top cornetists when he played Sunday at West high school with the Madison Musicians assn. band.

Brilliant tone and impeccable technique marked his playing, and he gave dynamic leadership to the band in two of his own marches.

Stepping out of his role as soloist-conductor-composer, Smith urged on the audience his support of a full-time professional band for Madison. This was the first indoor concert by the organization, which plays weekly summer concerts in Vilas park.

The quality of its playing emphasized the value of Smith's remarks.

The concert was a Pearl Harbor Memorial program, sponsored by the American Legion and its auxiliary.

CHRISTMAS MUSIC: The Medichor, Medigals, and Student Nurses chorus of the University of Wisconsin will give a Christmas concert at 4 p.m. Sunday in Music hall. Admission will be free.

The Medichor is a group of 50 medical students singing under the direction of Robert Edmondson, junior medical student from Waukesha. The Medigals are 12 women medical students, also directed by Edmondson.

Ellen Duwe directs the nurses.

Pig Named Eddie Gets Reprieve and Job with Zoo

CHICAGO (AP)—Saved from the slaughterhouse, Eddie the pig was headed for stardom Sunday at Brookfield Zoo.

Eddie, a friendly Berkshire barrow who comes when he's called, was sold at auction Friday at the International Livestock exposition.

Ham that he is, Eddie danced around the auction ring as the bidding mounted. Al Weisman, USO publicity director, offered the top bid of \$300.

Weisman then disclosed that he was buying the talented porker for an anonymous buyer, who wants to present Eddie to the zoo.

Zoo Director Robert Bean said the 240-pound porker would get top billing in a new children's zoo at Brookfield, which will open next summer.

He will romp in a ring with baby skunks, crows, and raccoons, all tame enough to play with children who visit the zoo.

"We're very happy Eddie's life has been saved," said Dean Eddie was raised by George Hoffman, a swine breeder of Ida Grove, Ia. Each year Hoffman contributes the proceeds from the sale of one pig to the USO in Chicago.

So this year the USO got \$300 worth of pig—\$25 more than was paid for the show's grand champion barrow.

Hoffman said Eddie owes his escape from the slaughterhouse to an early illness. He said constant pampering as a piglet made Eddie so friendly that a leash was needed to keep the pig from walking away with strangers.

Coast Guard Searches for Air Crash Victims

HAMILTON, Bermuda (UP)—The U. S. Coast Guard cutter Yamacraw and three planes searched heavy seas Sunday for the bodies of 20 of the 37 persons lost in the crash of a Compania Cubana Aviacion DC-4 Saturday.

Seventeen bodies already have been recovered in addition to four persons who survived the crash. Coast Guard officials gave up hope of finding any more survivors.

Meanwhile, four Cuban air officials arrived by plane to begin an investigation to determine the cause of the crash.
