JACOBY ON BRIDGE

Probably every bridge player remembers the thrill he got when he bid his first grand slam. The average slam either too timidly or too aggressively, depending on his or her temperament.

The player who is well grounded in the fundamentals of the point-count, however, can bid a grand slam with great assurance.

The main principle is very clearly explained for the teen-ager reader in Alfred Sheinfeld's brand new "First Book of Bridge." There are only 40 high-card points in the deck, he points out, and you need a combined count of at least 37 to consider a grand slam bid.

He gives the North hand as an example of a proper jump to seven no-trump after South opens the bidding with two no-trump. South should have a count of 22 to 24 points for the opening bid of two no-trump, and North has a count of 17 points.

North knows that the combined count should be at least

39 points. The defenders should have at most one jack between them, and it should be easy for South to make all 13 tricks.

The North hand was not chosen by accident. It was actually held in a recent rubber bridge game and South caused some difficulty by opening with two no-trump even though he held only 21 points instead of the orthodox 22 points. The missing point gave South a little trouble in the making of his contract. With only 12 tricks in top cards (if South had held one more jack he would have had 13 tricks in top cards), South had to "find" the jack of clubs in order to make his grand slam. The problem was: which opponent might possibly hold four clubs to the jack?

South found the solution by running all of his side-tricks before touching the clubs. He discovered that West could follow to three rounds of spades and three rounds of diamonds in addition to opening a heart suit that was presumably fairly long.

It was therefore clear that West couldn't have length in clubs. It was possible, however, that East had as many as four clubs.

Having arrived at this conclusion, declarer began the clubs by taking dummy's ace and queen.
