The Student and Young Artist auditions will be held Friday, Feb. 27, in Radio City Auditorium, Milwaukee.

Age limits in the Young Artists class are 23-35 for voice; 23-35 for piano and violin, and 20-35 for string quartet.

Winners will move to the central district auditions in Des Moines, Ia., on Mar. 14; winners in district auditions will compete for national awards.

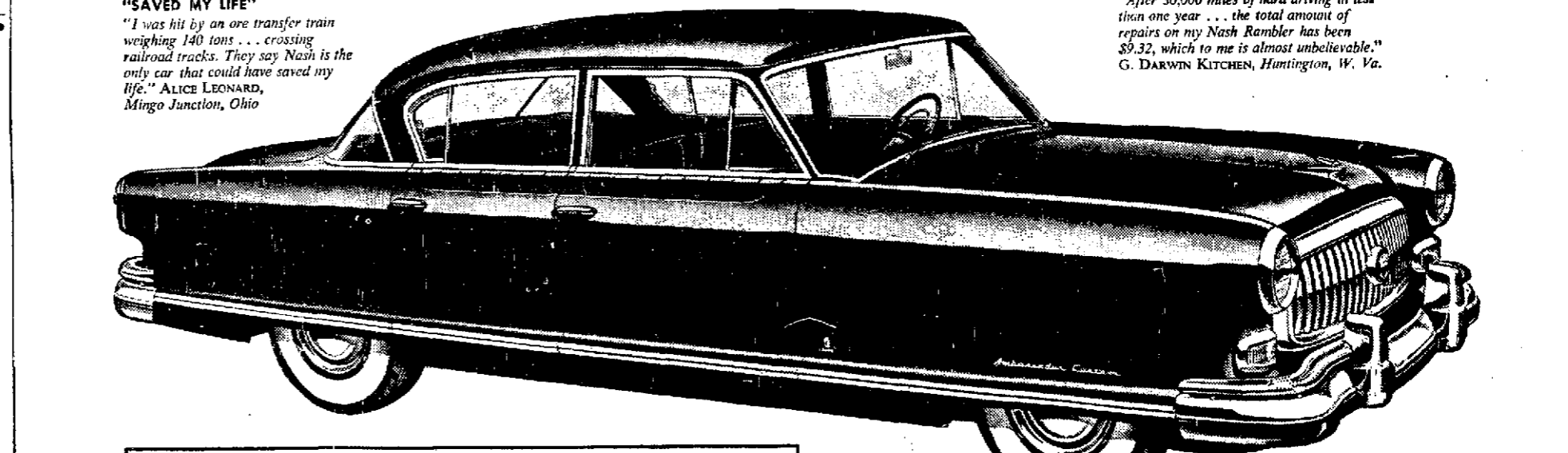
