

Farmers Told Farmers do not have to make an advance estimate of taxes due if they file their 1952 returns and pay their taxes by Jan. 31. In writing this provision into the law, Congress took into consideration the fact that many crops are harvested late in the year and the farmer isn't sure what his production is going to be until he gets it into the barn.

The tax estimate forms—form 1040-ES—may be obtained from the director of internal revenue for the district in which you live. Your postoffice or bank can give you the address.
