# Local Level Broadcasts

When television comes to Madison, one can hope, the stations will do a better job of local programming than they're doing on radio.

In fact, they'll have to do better, I think, if they are to hold their audiences. And they ought to be doing better on radio right now, even if it's only to be preparing for television—either to do work in that medium or to

for work in that medium or to compete with it with radio. Local programming today is limited aimost exclusively (except for WHA) to six types of programs—news, sports, churches, women's shows, farm programs, and phonograph records, with or without graph record disc jockeys.

How many dramatic shows are produced in Madison studios? How many musical programs bring us performers from the city and its trading area? What is offered along the line of discussion and comment? How many variety shows do we have? Or even quizzes?

Let's look at the record, as shown in the schedules of commercial stations published in The State Journal in the past week. Last Sunday, we find, they listed two periods of comment on the news, one of which was fed to the commercial station by WHA; one book review; one discussion on social security; one talk on pets, and dance music. All other Madison-produced programs were either church services, religious talks, news summaries, sports reviews, and music on records and transcriptions.

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
