

One of the most unusual plays that I have ever seen at a bridge table was executed by Barry Cohen, of Pasadena, in the recent National Championships held in Miami Beach.

Barry won the McKenney Trophy for 1952, awarded by the American Centract Bridge League annually to the player who has won the most master points in tournament play during that year. East's double of one no-trump







sentenced to correctional institu-tions for transporting stolen cars and two were fined \$50 each—one for attempted extortion, the other for harboring an army deserter.

Purchased Uniform

D.
