

Bill Doudna's SPOTLIGHT Inauguration on the Air TIP O' THE MORNING: New radio shows starting soon will star Marlene Dietrich (CBS), Lanny Ross (Mutual), and Jo. Stafford (CBS)...

THREE NETWORKS' coverage of the inauguration of Dwight D. Eisenhower will be broadcast a week from today by Madison radio stations. The principal portions of the day's events—parade, inauguration ceremonies, and the new president's address—will be on NBC-WIBA from 10:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.; on CBS-WKOW from 10:30 a.m. to noon, and on ABC-WISB from 10:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

In addition to the network programs, WISC will have a series of special broadcasts from Washington with Ralph O'Connor interviewing senators, representatives, and other leaders. These will be at 6:30 p. m. Saturday, 4:30 p. m. Sunday, 7:15 p. m. Monday, and 9 p. m. Tuesday. Here are details of network coverage, by stations:

NBC-WIBA George Hicks will coordinate the coverage. W. W. Chaplin, Kenneth Banghart and Ray Scherer will be "roving reporters" of the parade and ceremonies, covering the capitol and White House grounds. John Batchelder will be in the radio booth at the capitol, and Ned Brooks, Leaf Eld, and Maurice McGeary will cover the parade from mobile units. Stuart Finley and Holly Wright will have permanent vantage points for parade coverage. Frank Bourgholtzer, Earl Godwin, and Ray Henle will be stationed opposite the official reviewing stand.

CBS-WKOW Wells Church will supervise the operations from a master control booth under the capitol steps. Robert Trout will do the running story, with pickups from Douglas Edgerly, Charles Collins, Alton Jackson, Griffing Beroff, Bill Downs, Joe Wersbha, Claude Mahoney, and Edward Morgan at various points. Parade coverage will include spectator interviews by reporters with walkie-talkies. At 3 p. m., a one-hour roundup will include special recordings of the event, opinions by officials and ordinary citizens, and pickups from Paris, London, Vienna, Tokyo, other foreign capitals, Abilene, Kans., and other U. S. points. The inaugural ball will be on the air from 10:15 to 11 p. m.

Reporters will include Elmer Davis, on the capitol steps, John Edwards and Ruth Crane, in capitol rotunda; Leo Cherne, in mobile unit; Taylor Grant and Martin Agonsky, in Evening Star bldg.; Harold Slepely, at parade assembly point; Paul Harvey, at Treasury corner; Austin Kiplinger, at White House reviewing stands; Quincy Howe, opposite reviewing stands; Bryson Rash, at capitol steps; Gunnar Back, senate chamber; Walter Kiernan, in stands near capitol; Ted Malone, in public section at capitol. Howard Norton, 17-year-old president of American Legion Boys' Nations, will report the "youth viewpoint" from the capitol. Highlights will be reviewed in an hour-long program at 7, and the ball will be covered from 11:10 to 11:25 p. m.

ORGAN RECITAL: E. Power Biggs, concert and radio organist, will give a recital at 4 p. m. Sunday in Immanuel Lutheran church, Milwaukee. He will be assisted by a string group in Handel's "Concerto No. 13 for Organ and Strings." The program also will include "Concerto in A Minor," Vivaldi; "Adagio and Rondo for a Glass Harmonica," Mozart; "Fandasia and Fugue in G Minor," Bach; "Three Noels with Variations," Daquin; "Litanies," Alain; and "Sonata in C Minor on the 94th Psalm," Reubke.

JACOBY ON BRIDGE By Oswald Jacoby One of the most unusual plays that I have ever seen at a bridge table was executed by Barry Cohen, of Pasadena, in the recent National Championships held in Miami Beach. Barry won the McKenney Trophy for 1952, awarded by the American Contract Bridge League annually to the player who has won the most extra points in tournament play during the year. East's double of one no-trump was meant mostly to jockey for a part score, but Cohen converted it into a penalty double by passing. North could think of no better contract, so the hand was played at one no-trump doubled. Cohen opened a low spade, and dummy won with the king. East, Mrs. Sally Herman New York, played her lowest grade to show that she had no interest in the suit. Declarer led the jack of clubs from dummy, holding the trick. He continued with the ten of clubs, and this likewise was allowed to hold. Declarer naturally continued by leading a third club, declarer took from his own hand. Much to South's amazement, Cohen once more played a low club. This was an unusual play, but something far more unusual was to come. At this moment declarer had already won three clubs and a spade, and could take two more spade tricks whenever he liked. When dummy had possible tricks in both red suits, declarer decided to get out his contract. He therefore led a low diamond from his hand, and finessed dummy's ten. East won with the ace of diamonds and returned a spade, declarer winning with the queen. South now led another diamond towards dummy's queen, and the roof fell in on him. Barry Cohen stepped up with the king of diamonds, and laid down the ace of clubs, which he had saved for just this time. What could dummy safely do?
