**St. Olaf Choir**

**TIP O' THE MORNING:** When Ralph Marterie's band plays Friday night at the Washington and Lee ball, Wisconsin Prom-goers can get a pre-hearing of his music; it will be broadcast by NBC-WIBA at 11:30.

EVER since its founding 40 years ago, the St. Olaf choir has been a favorite of critics as well as of audiences. The organization will sing at 3:30 and 8 p. m. Saturday in Bethel Lutheran church with Dr. Olaf C. Christiansen, son of the founder, as conductor.

In its first year, a writer in Oslo, Norway, said: "The choir came, sang, and conquered... Let it be said at once that in all Norway there is no mixed chorus that can in any way compete with this choir from Minnesota."

When the St. Olaf choir last appeared in Madison—in 1950—this department commented: "The choir maintained the musical stature which the Christiansens have given it, with a tonal beauty that few such groups equal, a keen attention to detail without the intensity which can make such attention produce mechanical music, and clean intonation."

**Mossadegh Rejects Proposals by U. S. for Oil Settlement**

LONDON (UP)—Authoritative sources reported Tuesday night that Premier Mohammed Mossadegh of Iran had rejected American proposals for a settlement of the Anglo-Iranian oil dispute.

After weeks of negotiations with U.S. Ambassador Loy Henderson, the Iranian chief of state turned down his program in its present form and made counter-proposals, the informants said.

The foreign office received a detailed report on Henderson's negotiations in Tehran, but kept it secret. A spokesman said the report was being studied carefully by Middle Eastern experts.

The new deadlock followed eight meetings between Henderson and Mossadegh and five meetings here between Henry A. Brydson, head of the U.S. State Department's Near Eastern division, and Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden.

The new proposals by Mossadegh were believed to block any further consultations at least until after the new Washington administration has settled down to work, and Secretary of State John Foster Dulles has seen Eden here this month.

Mossadegh's spearhead of opposition was said to have been directed against a demand for compensation for the nationalized oil industry, as claimed by the Anglo-Iranian Oil Co.
